DISASTER TO A P. E. ISLAND VESSEL.—Dover, Feb. 18.—The schooner, Raven, of Prince Edward Island, got ashore two miles eastward of Dover, last night; was towed off derelict and into harbor by tug Palmerston, full of water.

DESTROYED BY FIRE.—The store and dwelling of Mr. L. W. G. Hayden, Morrell, with all its contents were totally destroyed by fire on the night of the 7th inst. We learn that Mr. Hayden and his clerk lately escaped with their lives. Loss partly covered with insurance.

A P. E. ISLAND CAPTAIN DROWNED.—Capt. Robert N. McKay was lost overboard, Feb. 14th, from Schooner Alton, Myrick, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., on the passage from Fortune Bay to Boston. No particulars were given. It is rumored that he had considerable money in gold, and as none was found among his effects, it is supposed that he had it about his person. He leaves a wife and six children in Gloucester. He was a native of Murray Harbor, Prince Edward's Island.

AN EXPLOSION.—At six o'clock on Saturday evening a noise like the report of a cannon was heard on Queen Street; and simultaneously the large plate-glass windows in the store of Mr. Alexander McKenzie, Confectioner, were observed to break and fall out. On repairing to the spot it appeared that there had been an explosion of escaped gas. From the smell, it was conjectured by the inmates, that gas was escaping in the cellar; and Mr. McKenzie—having first turned the gas off at the meter—took a light and went down to find out and stop the leak. The leak was much greater than was anticipated, and so the explosion took place. The cornice and furniture of the shop was considerably damaged; and two of Mr. McKenzie's children narrowly escaped with their lives.

A WANDERING FRAUD.—On Saturday last, we noticed the presence in St. John, of a Bavarian Jew named Steinlein, who had been duping people through the Upper Provinces, by representing himself as a St. C. Priest, collecting money for a mission. While in Quebec and vicinity, Steinlein is supposed to have raised considerable money. When at last exposed, he obtained a free pass to this city. He has been about St. John for several days, and it is believed gathered some money at Spurr's Cove and other places. He also called at the houses of some of his countrymen here. He imposed on a few people only, however, the warning regarding him having been published early. This morning he took his departure for Prince Edward Island, to visit Bishop McIntyre. The island people should learn the true character of this gentleman.—St. John Watchman.

A COURT HOUSE FOR BONSHAW.—We were shown, the other day, a plan and details of a County Court House, to be erected at Bonshaw, under the inspection of Richard Weeks, Esq., Supt. of Public Works, Queen's County. We judge from appearances, that it will be very suitable for the Court held in that place. The building will be 45 feet long, by 25 feet wide, and 14 feet 6 inches high, front portico 6 feet, by 8 feet. The whole superstructure will rest on a wall of cut stone, 3 tier deep from surface to sill, each course of stone will be 9 inches thick. The windows are semi-circular in the heads, and they, together with the outside door frames, are to be made of pitch pine. The interior consists of judge's private room, clerk's room, and audience room, capable of holding over one hundred people. This building will be quite an ornament to the place, and will give comfort to those who may have to go to trial and be made pay for their comfort. Although we are pleased to hear of these Government buildings being erected, yet we would like to see them (like a certain Council) not wanted. There is far too much litigation in our courts. It would be very much better for men in business to do less business, and do it more carefully, than to give such an extensive credit, and have to sue for it—an action which in many cases leaves the plaintiff as well as the defendant poorer going home than when they went to court. We must, however, expect a good deal of suing where there is imprisonment for debt.

MEMBER WILL OUT.—About nine years ago a man named Johnson was found dead at the foot of a cliff at Sydney Mines, under circumstances that would warrant the suspicion of foul play, but which, however, at the usual inquest, revealed nothing to justify the belief, and his death was ascribed to accidental causes. During the same year another man, named Andrews, was found in a similar position at the foot of a precipice at Cow Bay. This tragedy was surrounded with like mystery, and the same cause (accident) assigned to its commission. Both affairs had begun to be forgotten by all but, perhaps, the relatives of the deceased, when through a reliable source, comes the startling announcement that a murderer who was about to suffer the penalty of the law in Nevada, confessed to the murder and robbery of the two men whose deaths are given above. His name is Macdonald, a native, it is said of Pictou, N. S. While here he was familiarly known as Donald 'Shah,' and had the reputation of a rough. His last crime was the murder of his wife, done in the most cruel and atrocious manner. He was hanged at Nevada a few weeks ago.—North Sydney Herald.

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LATEST NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

To Reading Room and Examiner.

LONDON, March 10.—New complications have arisen between the Sultan of Turkey and the Christians. George Anderson asked in the Commons if it was true that General Schenk had withdrawn at the demand of the Government of Great Britain. Hon. Robert Bourke, one of the Under Secretaries for the Foreign Department, replied there was not the slightest foundation for the report that the British Government had demanded the recall of Mr. Schenk. This declaration was greeted with loud cheers.

HALIFAX, March 10.—The debate on the college question occupied the House all the afternoon, and a night session was held. The Opposition went against the Government Bill in a body. There was some disposition to separate the University Bill from the Bill providing grants. Mr. Hill said the two must be united and stand or fall together. At eleven o'clock to-night the vote was taken, when the Government was sustained by a vote of 20 to 17.

NEW YORK, March 9.—Gen. Belknap was arraigned before the Police Court, in Washington. He waived an examination and is held in \$25,000 to answer further. It is thought in Washington that Great Britain will claim indemnity of the United States on behalf of those Englishmen who suffered loss by the Emma Mine Scheme—they having invested their money in the belief that it was endorsed by the country through Minister Schenk as Trustee.

LONDON, March 9.—The statement yesterday that a republic was proclaimed in Serbia is denied. The Bishop of Munster has been removed. The Spanish Cortes is discussing a contraband trade of English vessels.

OTTAWA, March 9.—Two petitions in favor of prohibition were presented—one from Senator Tidal and the other from the Lambton County Council. Mr. Robitaille moved for a select committee to enquire into the possibility of establishing a submarine telegraphic system in the waters of the Gulf and River St. Lawrence—motion carried.
