Son's Contempt's Armor Against Demoralization

DEAR MARY HAWORTH: I write to you in utter despair. I have watched my husband sink lower and lower in his business, his character and morals for the past 10 years, though he is only in his thirties today. He comes of a very poor family but worked hard all his life, that is, until recently when he cannot seem to follow through. We have a son and daughter, ages 12 and 6 years. The boy is tall, bright and an exceedingly handsome but completely oblivious of his father's misdeeds. He is insolent, insulting and subtly indifferent to all correction. His quiet, sure, self-assumed superiority reduces my husband and me to sounding like gasping, pleading fools.

Before all is lost—if I advise already—can you or any other four counsel to others seems fine, warm and deeply considered. Is there any hope for us? Our family have all but ostracized us and our friends gone. I have almost lost my faith and cannot try much longer.

Dear E.W.: Your son's attitude of contempt for his parents is demoralizing for all concerned, as he watches his father deteriorate and his mother drink draughts of self-loathing.

When he looks down upon those of you, it is a minute of superiority, he is in effect cutting himself off from such satisfactions as progress, as he to absolve himself of any kinship with such incompetents. It is his way of saying to himself that he would wish to be different and better than these two (treasonous failures) he views them.

In fledging out as a person, your child has great need to love his parents with spontaneous trustful dependency upon their strength, ability, wisdom and devoted dependability in helping him climb the ladder of growth. Should their inadequacies deprive him of this framework of psychological support, he can only recoil in a kind of shocked dismay, without even recognizing the nature of his critical frustration he is suffering from and reacting to. This I mention to give you a glimpse of your son's subjective trials in the unhappy family situation.
