**Is Well Known Bapt. Evangelist**

The Rev. Ivor Powell, known as "The Man from Wales" is one of the widest known denominational evangelists in the world today. Born in a coal mining valley in Wales he followed his father into the local industry. Mr. Powell went to South Africa in 1948 to become evangelist of the South African Baptist Union. During four years there campaigns were held in every Baptist Church from Cape

**STUDENT ACCIDENT INSURANCE PLAN**

This insurance will cover the parents for bodily injuries caused by an accident sustained by the students during the school year, when the injury is sustained:—

- While in or on school buildings or premises at which the student is a pupil during the time the student is required to be therein or thereon by reason of attendance at such school on any regular school day;
- While in attendance at or participating in a regularly scheduled school activity approved and supervised by proper authority of such school (this includes all athletics either at school or away from school);
- While travelling directly to or from such regularly scheduled and approved school activity with other students of such school as a group, provided such group is at the time under supervision of proper authority of the school; or
- While travelling directly to or from the Student's residence and such school for the purpose of attending school or participating in any school sponsored activity.

**COVERAGE**

The Plan pays up to \$2,500.00 for medical expenses incurred within one year of the date of the accident. This includes surgery or other treatment administered by a legally qualified physician, surgeon, physio-therapist, or osteopath; hospital charges; x-rays, nurses' fees, and ambulance costs. Dental treatment, for injury to natural teeth, is payable up to \$100.00. If injury results in death, dismemberment or loss of sight, within 90 days from the date of the accident, the following benefits will be paid:—

rushes and flags. They generally do unless disturbed accidentally by a boat or nosed out by a hunting dog.

**BUT FAST**

Quite a few wildgeese are awing and chances are good for the odd honker being included in the bag on October 1st. To date they have displayed no great desire to frequent the fields but some will blunder into duck hunters during routine morning flights. Last opening day some hunters after huns got a few breaks. A hun looks pretty small when compared to goose but what a hun lacks in size it makes up in speed and sportiness. In some sections huns are quite plentiful compared to last seasons in others the coveys are not so close spaced. In districts where they were apparently nonexistent last season there areas high as two coveys to a farm.

Pheasants are spotty. Farmers often remark: "We have quite a few huns but no pheasants. We used to have all kinds of them." In a few remote areas there are "pockets" of pheasants numbering up to five or six coveys—maybe flocks would be more appropriate—with no other sign of pheasants for miles outside this particular perimeter. A more definite announcement regarding the hunting outlook this October 1st will be written on the 28th if I am still on the rounds.

Quite a few complaints have been received regarding the depredations of ravens on domestic poultry as well as game birds. It is apparent that the raven is becoming quite a factor in the general well being of our upland game birds. Space forbids touching on this subject at the moment. A number of trappers have requested information on the price outlook for mink and muskrat this coming fall.

There is a top crop of muskrats and mink are also more plentiful than last season although the mink crop last year was normal if not slightly on the up over 1955. One trapper attributes the increase in mink this fall to the fact that deep snows last winter forced the trapping poacher to forego his mid-winter illegal trapping activities. Be that as it may it sure was a tough winter to get around in the woods or along stream side. Fur prices are another question. The way it looks at the moment the one dollar muskrat for this November is only a dream—it's nearer the 60 cent bracket. Mink show a little stronger tendency but only slightly.

**Thefts Are Reported From S'ide**

The unusual circumstances of what might be called a double theft was one of three thefts reported in Summerside during the past couple of days. In the one referred to above, a cardboard carton containing cigarettes was stolen from a panel truck while the owner and an assistant were restocking a cigarette vending machine at the Stop and Shop Grocery Store on North Market Street.

While the two men were in the act of chasing the youthful thieves who abandoned the cigarettes and fled, another group appeared on the scene and under cover of darkness, took advantage of the situation to enter the truck and make their escape with cigarettes.

A short time later when the owner, Mr. Eldon Hickey, called at a restaurant nearby, he learned that young lads had called there a short time before, trying to sell potato tariff had been discussed.

Some of these stolen cigarettes were recovered yesterday by Const. Elmer Theeson.

In another theft, the Spot, a canteen on Water Street West, was entered on Wednesday night, by forcing two doors at the back entrance to the canteen operated by Mrs. Allan Arsenault, and a quantity of chocolate bars, wieners, potato chips, and gum, amounting to a value of about \$50 was stolen.

**J. Watson MacNaught Speaks On Colombo Plan**

Mr. J. Watson MacNaught was the guest speaker Tuesday afternoon at the regular monthly meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Trinity United Church which was held in the Epworth Hall.

Mr. MacNaught delivered an address on the Colombo plan in which he outlined the reasons for its need and traced its operations since its origin at Colombo, Ceylon, in January 1950. This was at a meeting of the foreign ministers of the Commonwealth countries.
