Bomb Scare Fails To Close Eaton's

The Charlottetown store of The Eaton Co. Ltd. continued business as usual yesterday despite an anonymous phone call which stated a bomb had been placed in the store and was scheduled to go off at 2 p.m.

The explosion failed to materialize and the store continued its regular business during the period around 2 o'clock. It had been announced that the building was to be evacuated around 1.30 but this proved untrue as no move was made to clear the store of customers or employees.

The anonymous call was placed with the switchboard at Eaton's at approximately 10 o'clock stating that the bomb had been planted and would explode at 2 o'clock. Moments after the call came in the store notified the Charlottetown police and Police Chief Stiers Westfield. He detailed 20 men to search the large building but after two searches of all likely spots nothing was found. It was impossible to search the entire building because of its size.

EXPLOSIVE EXPERTS
The Attorney-General's department requested 5 Military Corps commander, Col. Keith Johnson, five assistants and Col. Johnston had two explosive experts from here by the R.C.A.F. From the ammunition technical section at Debert, N.S., Major G.P. Halliwell, military advisor with the militia group was in charge of the bomb disposal detail.
