

# Football 'Callers' Have Tough Time

It wouldn't be a surprise if the Big Four Football Union lost a field official this season. The profession of calling the shots in pro football—and hockey—is becoming tougher each year.

Officials rarely receive unanimous support of the fans, players, coaches or club executives. So, the referee, umpire or what have you always is-on-the-spot.

A week ago, Hamilton Tiger-Cats invaded Toronto for the first league game at the new Canadian National Exhibition Stadium in Toronto. Just about every one of the 27,554 people on hand agreed it wasn't a good game. Both teams made mistakes, there were costly fumbles and the game eventually slowed down to the old two-bucks-and-a-dick style.

**WHO TO BLAME?** If much of the blame was attributed to the live game officials. They called every infraction—which they are paid to do—and as a result the game was slowed down considerably.

Handkerchiefs fluttered to the ground 24 times and the officials were criticized by some sports writers for what they termed "over-officiating."

Big Four referee-in-chief Hap Shoultice of Ottawa, watching the game, defended his officials by saying: "It's early in the season and a lot of mistakes are being made."

"We call them, to try to make the coaches and players correct them."

That softened the criticism for the game officials who, according to Canadian Football League rules, can't defend themselves in the public prints. Shoultice knows all about officials' troubles—he was a Big Four referee for years until the pressure became too great and he quietly resigned.

The mortality rate of pro hockey and football officials has been fairly extensive the last few years.

One of the most dramatic incidents of the Stanley Cup playoffs last spring involved Referee Red Storey of the National Hockey League. NHL president Clarence Campbell was quoted as saying that Storey "froze" on a play during a Montreal-Chicago game.

Storey quit.

Two years previously, Jack Mehenbacher overheard a bristling conversation through an open transom and it convinced him he should get out of the business of refereeing NHL games.

"One night, a top NHL executive cornered referee-in-chief Carl Voss outside the referees' room between periods. I was the referee of the game. This executive proceeded to call me everything he could think of and I got it first-hand through the open transom. It got so I couldn't sleep at nights, trying to do a conscientious job in an unconscious setting."

"I quit, and I'm glad I did."

The last Big Four official to quit under pressure was Jimmy Simpson of Hamilton who took public abuse for years from coaches, players and team officials.

Simpson, who played with Hamilton teams from the late 1920s to the early 1940s, gave up his job after the 1956 Big Four playoffs. Hamilton lost to the Alouettes at Montreal and Ticat President Jake Gaudaur and Coach Jim Trimble invaded the officials' room in high dudgeon.

At that time, Judge Allan Fraser of Ottawa was Big Four commissioner. His limited authority precluded any disciplinary action against a club official so he fined the club itself \$500.

Club executives met to discuss the incident and decided that Judge Fraser could only fine players and reprimand team officials and coaches for conduct detrimental to football. The judge—and Simpson—quit.

What seemed to be a lop-sided game, turned into a thriller in the top of the second; George Bradley came through again, this time with a circuit clout into deep left field, with the bases loaded to bring the Aces within striking distance of the Lions the score reading 5-4.

Jackie Brandt slammed a solo home run with one out in the last of the ninth, giving San Francisco Giants a 4-3 victory over Chicago Cubs Wednesday. A crowd of 16,422 watched the National League leaders open their final home stand.

Brandt's blast, his 12th homer, came off reliever Don Elston and climaxed an afternoon in which two other Giants hit the ball out of the playing field.

Big Sam Jones, who came on in the ninth as the Cubs rallied with two runs to tie the score, gained credit for his 18th victory while Elston took his seventh loss.

**OTHER HOMERS**

Earlier, Felipe Alou and Willie McCovey homered for the Giants while Bobby Thomson connected with a Cub round-tripper off San Francisco starter Mike McCormick, who worked 8 1/3 innings.

Elston relieved Art Ceccarelli, lifted for a pinch hitter in the top half of the ninth.

San Francisco collected just five hits, but three of them went all the way. The Cubs had six hits, a homer and five singles.

McCormick sailed into the ninth, having given up only two runs and holding a 3-1 lead. He retired pinch hitter Earl Averill, but then Chicago began rallying and tied the score at 3-3.

## RIFT IS INDICATED Floyd Patterson Resents Cus d'Amato's Action

NEW YORK (AP)—Has a rift developed between Floyd Patterson, former world heavyweight champion, and Cus d'Amato, his manager?

There were indications Wednesday that the two were not getting along as smoothly as they had in the past when d'Amato's concern for the young Negro athlete was almost parental.

Patterson, now only 24 and winner of the crown in December of 1956, told Milt Gross, sports columnist of the New York Post, that "I don't see Cus as frequently as I did before the fight. He's been away most of the time since these things started coming up. He's been out of town for about three weeks."

Prior to this disclosure Patterson said he resented that d'Amato had met and conferred with Anthony (Fat Tony) Salerno, Harlem gangland figure, regarding the promotion of the June 26 bout with Ingemar Johansson of Sweden. Johansson knocked Patterson out in the third round.

# Diller Hanover Is Winner Of Hambletonian Classic

**DU QUOIN, Ill. (AP)**—Unruffled by a lost shoe, odds-on choice Diller Hanover scored a straight-heat victory worth \$73,667 Wednesday in the Hambletonian, richest harness race in history.

The bay son of Star's Pride lost a shoe on his right front foot at about the three-quarter pole of the second heat but it didn't stop him from taking the final dash in 2:01.45.

Ordinarily, such a mishap would throw a trotter off balance and cause him to break stride.

Diller Hanover, a bargain at \$6,300, withstood the stretch challenge of staminatee Tie Silk to win the first mile in 2:01.15.

**PINCH-HIT DRIVER**

Pinch-hitter Frank Ervin, driving Diller Hanover for only the second time, said "I wasn't in the doubt about the second heat but

I was a little afraid of Tie Silk the first time."

The Diller Hanover-Ervin combination proved too much for 14 competitors in this 34th renewal of the year's biggest race for three-year-old trotters, worth \$125,284.

Tie Silk and Flight Song trailed him the first mile; Circo and Lady Belvedere, the lone filly in the field, in the second.

Ervin's strategy with Diller Hanover was nearly identical in each dash. In the first heat, he held the colt in favorable position until the three-eighths of a mile post. Then Ervin made his move.

Turning into the stretch with Tie Silk on the drive, Diller Hanover edged over the line by a neck.

**EARLIER MOVE**

In the second heat, Ervin made his move a little later, bringing

Diller to the front about the three-quarter spot and leaving little doubt of the outcome in the stretch.

A crowd of 22,000 in the fashionable racing quarters at the Du Quoin State Fair saw Diller Hanover push his career earnings to \$205,784.

Ervin, long frustrated in his attempts to win a Hambletonian, got his chance when regular driver-trainer Ralph Baldwin filled a contract obligation and drove Tie Silk, the other-half of the Baldwin entry.

**SECOND GEM**

The victory gave Diller Hanover the second gem in trotting's triple crown and made the colt from Hall Stables of Watertown, N.Y. the horse to beat for the season's championship.
