AN ISLANDER DROWNED. The ship Shelburne, which arrived at Philadelphia on the 8th inst. from Glasgow, reports:—On 26th ult. in lat 38 45, lon. 61.55, experienced a hurricane from the south-west, lasting four hours, during which Joseph Corish, a seaman, of Prince Edward Island, aged 24, fell from the main-topgallant yard and was lost. Great indignation is manifested at the disclosure that he was picked up on the streets, a pistol put to his head and forced into a close carriage. Subsequently, it is said, he was taken to Crookston, Minn., in a close carriage, making 110 miles the first day. The arrest of two parties in Winnipeg, said to have been engaged in the kidnapping, is expected. PRINCIPAL L. B. MILLER, of the Charlottetown Business College, is having his College Rooms frescoed and painted. The races have, we learn, been well filled, and an interesting day's sport may be expected. Parties leaving Charlottetown by 8.12 train will arrive at the track in good time for the races.

The Moosepath Races.

BLACK PILOT A WINNER.

St. JOHN, Sept. 12. The biggest crowd for many years patronized the races at Moosepath Driving Park yesterday. The three minute class was contested by three horses. Mr. George A. Dockendorff's stallion, Black Pilot, won it in three straight heats. The best time made was 2.51. Knox Lass, of Sussex, was second, and Tom Morris third. As Black Pilot made a record of 2.33 at Bangor, a protest was entered against his start in the race. The colt race had five starters. Maud F. of St. John, won in two straight heats in 3.13 and 3.08, with Conductor, of Frederickton second, and the Moncton colt, Curramont, third. In the free-for-all race, Young Dexter, Lady Bashaw and Flying Dutchman, of St. John, Helena, of Amherst, Edward Bonner, of St. Stephen's, and Long John, of Truro, started. Helena won in three straight heats. The best time being 2.37, Long John second and Bonner third. The stallion Rampart gave an exhibition between final heats of this race in a 2.40 clip.

The Wanderers Defeat the St. John Men

St. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 12. The match between the Wanderers and the St. John Club was concluded yesterday. Time was called before the second innings of the St. John team was finished. The match was decided in favor of the Wanderers who made 140 runs while the St. John men made 73. In the second innings the Wanderers made 145, and the St. John men 43, with five out.

A Bold Attempt to Enter Woolwich Magazine

LONDON, Sept. 12. Two men last night approached a sentry on duty at the powder magazine at Woolwich, and before he could give an alarm they seized and beat him in a brutal manner, leaving him half dead at his post. They then attempted to enter the magazine, but becoming alarmed at some noise in the vicinity, decamped.

The Russo-Afghan Frontier.

LONDON, Sept. 12. The report that Russia and England have signed a protocol, delineating the Russo-Afghan frontier, is confirmed. The Afghan Frontier Commission will meet in November and complete the details. M. Tassar, special Russian Commissioner, will return to St. Petersburg on Sunday, his commission being ended.

The Puritan and Genesta.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12. There was another disappointment in the race between the Puritan and Genesta yesterday. Owing to the lack of wind the race could not be finished in seven hours. The yachts were towed in and the race was ordered to be started again to-day.

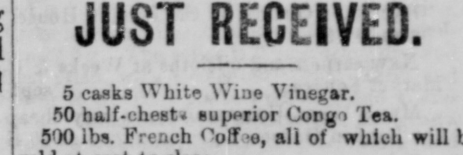
