AN Ottawa correspondent says that, according to the statements of Lieut. Governor Laird, the reports of Indian depredations in the North-west were greatly exaggerated, and that the condition of the Indians who have settled on the reserves and put in crops is favourable, but the buffalo hunting Indians are not in such a satisfactory condition.

By reason of an unaccountable and unfortunate oversight the excursion in the *Heather Belle* to Mount Stewart, yesterday, was not advertised in the DAILY EXAMINER, and though the weather was magnificent, only about a dozen persons enjoyed the pleasure of the trip. The excursion to Orwell to-day, which was duly advertised, was taken advantage of by as many persons—men and women, boys and girls, old, middle aged, and young—as the steamer could carry.

In the House of Commons a day or two ago, Mr. Foster, Secretary of State for Ireland, referred to a "disturbing speech," calculated to arouse old animosities between England and Ireland, recently delivered by Mr. Dillon, M. P., and condemned it as "wicked and cowardly." He is reported to have said that, "in the present state of the feeling in Ireland, the late failure of the crops, and of the commercial distress which has prevailed for several years throughout the entire world, any man who deliberately excites the passions and prejudices of the Irish people towards the Government, is guilty of trying to provoke civil war with all its horrors." Mr. Foster said that, in common with all members of the Opposition, he believed "in the free discussion of public questions, but trusted that no one was weak enough to confound that right and duty with the rant of fanatics who were bent on serving a revolutionary and partisan purpose, altogether regardless of consequences or law."

Movements of the Governor-General.

His Excellency and suite are evidently enjoying themselves in the Maritime Provinces. They are visiting all the chief points of interest. On Tuesday they inspected Londonderry Iron Mines, and are reported to have been much pleased with the operations of the Iron Workers. On Wednesday, instead of coming here as was anticipated, they went to Antigonish en route to Cape Breton, which they will visit before they honor this Island with their presence.

Smash-up on the Intercolonial.

On Tuesday last, between Cacoma and Riviere Du Loup, a ballasting train, going down a steep grade, ran into a herd of cattle and killed five of them. The engines were thrown of the track and several of the cars were demolished. The regular express train going east, was, in consequence, detained about five hours, and was six hours late getting into Moncton.

LIEUT. GOVERNOR LAIRD is expected home this evening. He will receive a cordial welcome to his native Province. We are glad to learn that Governor Laird is very popular in the Northwest.

In the second match of the Provincial Rifle Association shooting, to-day, David Harper made a score of 34 out of a possible 35. We will publish the scores in full to-morrow.

"The Blanche's Black Blossoms."

The appearance of the troupe was every way creditable, and the "end-men" were as amusing as could be expected. Mr. Lane as "Skins" is evidently the heavy weight of the company, while McLeary as "Bones" was a very good second. The singing of Mr. Hutchings, the dancing of Messrs. Whatly and Graham, and the concertina playing of Mr. Lea were the best features of the performance and were loudly encored, while the stump speech of Mr. Lane brought down the house and accounted fully for "the milk in the cocoa-nut" of his popularity with his fellow tars. In consequence of many persons being unable to obtain admission, owing to the crowded state of the Hall, the performance was announced to be repeated this evening, and the object being such a worthy and charitable one, we trust that the "Black Blossoms" may again be greeted with an overflowing house.
