



OSWALD'S BODY MOVED

A few police, funeral home employees and onlookers were present Monday as the body of Lee Harvey Oswald was moved into the small chapel at Rose Hill Cemetery, where he was buried. Police kept spectators away. Oswald, charged with the assassination of President Kennedy at Dallas Friday, was shot to death Sunday as he was leaving Dallas city building under police escort.

Ousted Group Is Included As New Iraq Cabinet Formed

BEIRUT, Lebanon (Reuters)—A new cabinet including members of the Ba'ath Socialist party has taken over in Iraq. The move confirmed expectations that while President Abdul Salam Aref's backed coup Monday ousted the Ba'ath Socialist government, it did not smash the party itself. Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser, in contrast with Aref, headed by plane from Athens, Greece, to Beirut Thursday night. Saadi left Iraq 11 days ago when an earlier coup collapsed.

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Police Chief in Dallas Reviews Oswald Case

DALLAS (AP)—Police Chief Jesse Curry has listed evidence to back up his contention that Dallas police had "a concrete case" growing Lee Harvey Oswald was the assassin of President Kennedy.

The evidence, he said, includes a clear photograph showing Oswald holding a rifle of the same type used in the assassination. This was a 6.5 mm. bolt-action model of Italian make with a telescopic sight.

The chief said this proof that Oswald possessed a rifle of the same type as the one that fired the fatal shots was the most conclusive element of the evidence.

District Attorney Henry Wade said he would not release the physical evidence.

Backing up the photograph, Curry said, is a written order in Oswald's handwriting to a Chicago mail-order house for a rifle costing \$178. He said the FBI now is checking the serial number of the rifle used in the assassination with that of the mail-order weapon.

A second vital link in the chain of evidence tying Oswald to the assassination, Curry said, is testimony from witnesses

that Oswald was in the Texas book depository—from where the shots were fired—at the time the president was assassinated.

In Washington, meanwhile, an informed source said the federal government was considering all possible ways to make public the evidence pointing to Oswald as Kennedy's assassin.

Washington officials are known to believe information about Oswald's role in the assassination is vital—not only in giving Americans knowledge about their president's death but in coping with possible friction in U.S.-Soviet relations.

Moscow has been tempering its eulogies to Kennedy with criticisms of implications that Communists might be to blame for Kennedy's assassination.

There was no indication how the federal government could take the wraps off the evidence.

Wade, as a state official, is not officially accountable to any federal official.

The photographic evidence

Curry said she told police the weapon was not there Friday. The man who gave Oswald a rifle to work Friday morning notified he was carrying a long package wrapped in brown paper, Curry said. Oswald told the man it contained window shades. Curry said it was long enough to contain a rifle.

Police say Oswald was a marksman when he was lithe Marine. The FBI has identified a palm print found atop stacks of book boxes near the ambush window as that of Oswald's.

Oswald admitted to police he was a member of the Communist party, Curry said.

Oswald claimed he was also a member of the left-leaning Fair Play for Cuba committee.

Oswald admitted under questioning he was in the building

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
