Bishop's Condition Slightly Improved

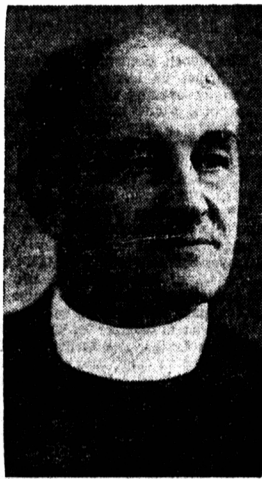

OTTAWA, (CP) — William Appleby, 30, of St. Boniface, Man., Saturday was elected president of the Young Liberal Federation of Canada, at the organization's 1954 national convention here. He succeeds Guy Rouleau, Liberal member of Parliament for Dollard-St. Laurent, who held the office for 2 1/2 years.

Child Injured In Explosion

TRURO, (CP) — Sharon Fleck, 5, had two fingers blown off and an eye badly injured Saturday night when an explosive in the kitchen of her parents was playing with blew up in the kitchen of their home in nearby Upper Stewiacke. Her parents were away shopping. A rifle bullet or dynamite cap is believed to have caused the blast. None of the other children were injured and hospital authorities said Sharon is in "satisfactory" condition.

Four Children Perish In Fire In Newfoundland

KELLOGGERS, Nfld. (CP) — Four children perished in a blazing hungalow here Sunday while firemen tried vainly to put the fire out with a hopelessly inadequate supply of water from a nearby well. William J. Cluney groped through the smoke to rescue his wife, elderly mother-in-law and five of his children but the remaining four died when the flames barred Cluney from re-entering the building. The victims were Harold, 2, Donna, 3, Rosiland, 7, and Tasker 10. Cluney said he discovered the outbreak shortly after lighting the kitchen stove while the others were still in bed but investigators could not determine the specific cause of the fire. Firemen were summoned from St. John's, 17 miles from here, but the shortage of water made them practically helpless.

Find NATO Machinery Cumbersome

WASHINGTON, (AP) — Two U.S. senators reported Saturday the machinery for sending NATO forces into action against an aggressor "is cumbersome and unwieldy to the point where it might be a forerunner to disaster." Senators Styles Bridges (Rep.-N.H.), chairman of the powerful senate appropriations committee, and Stuart Symington (Dem.-Mo.) former air secretary, reported on a visit to Europe in February and March. They said the supreme allied commander in Europe must obtain "the permission of each government through its permanent representative on the North Atlantic council to institute alert measures with respect to the nation's forces." "This procedure would seem to carry grave disadvantage in this air-atomic age," they said. GRAVE DISADVANTAGE Gen. Alfred Gruenther, commander of supreme headquarters of NATO in Europe, "could not put his forces into action until NATO recognized a state of war." "This mistiness in command authority should be cleared promptly; otherwise, in case of aggression against the free world, the billions of dollars the United States has invested in the defence of Europe may turn into total waste." Both the United States and Canada have contributed men and arms to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization forces on the continent. The senators made several other recommendations. They called for a "thorough and careful reappraisal of foreign aid" before "the American people are asked to contribute further." Symington and Bridges also called for a re-examination of the entire program for air bases in western Europe and North Africa in the light of the start of construction of new bases in Spain, France and Italy. "Some 20 items of government legislation including a number of important measures still must be approved before prorogation."
