

Fine New B.I.S. Building Now Nearing Completion

The Benevolent Irish Society's new Whelan Memorial Building on Grafton street is rapidly nearing completion and when finished will bear testimony to the enterprise of the members of that organization who suffered such a setback in the fire of a year and a half ago when their splendid quarters were razed to the ground. The entire second floor will be occupied by the law firm of Matheson, Peake and Nicholson and contains a spacious reception room just inside the stair landing, which opens on a broad reach into the main floor by a long counter. The staff room is 33 by 14 and has full lighting from three sides and provides adequate room for the stenographers and their equipment. There are three private offices for the members of the firm, each 11 by 10 feet, away from the general offices and reached through an additional hallway, with a fourth office slightly larger at the front. The law library is 28 by 15, and will be fitted with tables and chairs along with book shelves to take care of the reference books necessary in a well equipped office of this kind. The two ground floor areas, fitted with 7ft 6 inch plate glass windows, and 6 ft 6 inch inset towards the entrance doors, are 16 1-2 ft wide and 40 feet deep with 20 square rooms in the rear for storage. The building is stucco trimmed on the exterior and fittingly displays ownership in a concrete block inserted over the centre. It is expected that the building will be occupied in about three weeks. The County Construction Company erected the building, which is being wired by the Redmond Electric Co., with plumbing by Wilfred McKenna Co.

A.F.L. Elects Former Plumber As President

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—George Meany, 58-year-old former plumber became president of the American Federation of Labor today, and his first act was to renew a merger bid to the CIO. He expressed confidence that the two big organizations can bury differences to work out a merger satisfactory to both. A veteran of 30 years in labor posts, Meany was unanimously selected by the AFL's 14-member executive council to succeed late William Green. Green died last Friday after serving more than 25 years as AFL president. Meany had been the AFL's secretary-treasurer under Green and, during the years of Green's declining health, had been the major leader of the AFL's 8,000,000 members. Named by the AFL council to succeed Meany as secretary-treasurer was William Schiltzer, 46, of Chicago, president of the AFL Bakery and Confectionery Workers' Union. Meany's proposal for a reunion of the unions drew a friendly response from Emil Rieve, senior vice-president of the CIO. Rieve said in New York: "I welcome his optimism about unity between the CIO and the AFL and I hope his optimism will bring 'satisfactory results.'"

CIO leaders meet in Atlantic City, N. J., beginning Friday to select a president to succeed the late Philip Murray. He died Nov. 9. LONDON, Nov. 25 (Reuters)—London was chilled and fog-bound early today after the coldest November night in 12 years. Horse racing was abandoned, pipes frozen, trains late. Audience Enjoyed Audubon Screen Tour

"Below the Big Bend" was the subject of an unusually interesting talk, as vivid and instructive coloured moving pictures carried the audience of Allan D. Cruickshank down the wide sweeps of the Rio Grande River at the Prince of Wales College hall last night. This Audubon Screen Tour was the second of a series presented by the Prince Edward Island Women's Institutes, in co-operation with the Audubon Society of Canada. Deriving its name from the wide sweep of the Rio Grande River, this spectacular wilderness is crowned by the jagged tops of the Ghost Mountains which tower like flat desert floors. Ranging from mountain tops to the gigantic canyons of the Rio Grande, Mr. Cruickshank took his audience to explore the spectacular wild life of the region that is still the Wild West. Portrayed in beautiful natural colors, the audience had the thrilling experience of accompanying Mr. Cruickshank in pictures as he explored the country in search of rare birds, and animals, stopping to catch the glory of the springtime carpets of flowers in the desert. A trip is made to a cave of two million bats, which start into the open at dusk and continue their flight for four hours. These birds are protected and counted a blessing as they forage all night long and keep down the myriads of insects which would otherwise make life impossible in the inhabited areas of this wild country. The speaker was introduced by Miss Mary Robin, B.Sc., Home Economics Supervisor, Provincial Department of Agriculture. Mrs. Harold Laird, Kelvin Grove, President of the P. E. Island Women's Institutes, Mrs. R. L. Burge, Secretary, Mrs. Neil Matheson, Miss Mary Robin and Mrs. Maylea Manning arranged for the "Lecturographer" to appear here.

St. Louis Continued from page 1 the ground about two feet from the main wreckage. We wrapped him in blankets, but he was badly burned. As the fire spread, 1,000 rounds of ammunition exploded, driving the rescuers back. The Lancaster was on a supply run from Vancouver to Comox when it crashed near this bomber-training station. "There is no immediate explanation for the crash," said an R. C. A. F. spokesman. "But the weather was bad and the pilot was making an instrument-aided approach. He may have stalled the plane and been too low to recover." Eye witnesses reported, the bomber appeared to have engine trouble a split second before the crash. "I could hear the roar of the engines," said William Roddich, a farmer. "Then they seemed to cut out and in a split second it was out of a cloud, down below, bursting into flames." "I could see the fire all through the plane, even in the metal."

BOOKIE JOINTS RAIDED EDMONTON, Nov. 25 (CP)—Forty-five RCMP and city police raided seven or eight "bookie joints" today and arrested about 20 men, including four alleged "key operators." It was the biggest raid of its kind in the city's history. Months of preparation went into the raid, police said.

Court Finds statement of claim on the ground that the provisions of the P.E.I. Marketing Scheme as authorized by the provisions of the Agricultural Products (P.E.I.) Act and other powers and authorities it thereto enabling, has no bearing on the said contracts signed by the plaintiff and defendant and thus the said contracts are void.

The Court was asked to determine the validity of these pleadings and the points of law raised by them. Facts Agreed Upon Before the hearing the following facts were agreed upon by counsel: "1. The purpose of this agreement, the parties agreed, that at the date of the contract or contracts no license was issued by the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board to the plaintiff. "2. Subsequently on the 17th day of November 1951, a license was issued to the plaintiff by the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board which purported to license the plaintiff to deal in potatoes, expiring on the 30th day of June 1952. "3. That the plaintiff at all relevant times was licensed by the Department of Agriculture, Marketing Service, Ottawa, to engage in business as a dealer, in inter-provincial export and import trade in fresh fruit and vegetables under the Fruit, Vegetables and Honey Act and regulations thereunder. "4. That during the period from June 30, 1951, to Nov. 17, 1951 (the date of issue of the 1951 license), no license had been issued to the plaintiff by the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board. "5. That on the 11th day of December, 1950, a license had been issued by the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board to the plaintiff to deal in potatoes, expiring on the 30th of June, 1951. "6. That on the 9th of March, 1951, the plaintiff purported to cancel the said license and the plaintiff for non-payment of levy under Board Order No. 2."

Marketing Scheme The judgment notes that a scheme for the marketing of potatoes under the Agricultural Products Marketing Act was set up by Order-in-Council dated 5th Sept. 1950, under which the Marketing Board was established and certain powers granted to it. Sections 16 and 18 of this scheme are quoted in full, also Board orders issued relevant to the scheme, Nos. 1, 2 and 3. A dealer's license was issued to the plaintiff on Nov. 17, 1951, by the Marketing Board, licensing him to buy, sell and market potatoes in conformity with the provisions of the scheme, and any regulations made thereunder. It was due to expire June 30, 1952. The judgment quotes a document sent to the plaintiff on March 9, 1951, signed by D.A. MacDonald, chairman of the Potato Marketing Board, notifying him that at a meeting of the Board held at the Board's office on Wednesday, March 7th, his license as a dealer was cancelled for violation of the Board's Order No. 2, the said cancellation becoming effective at midnight on the 7th day of March, 1951.

Levies on Dealers The judgment continues: "Order No. 2 imposed a levy on every dealer at the rate of 1 cent per hundred pounds for every hundred lbs shipped or exported by the dealer from the Province of Prince Edward Island for the purpose of establishing a fund for the Potato Marketing Board. Order No. 2 required the producer to pay the levy or charge of 1 cent per hundred pounds in respect of all potatoes sold or marketed by such producer. The dealer was made the collector of the said levy from the producer; and was required to send a statement to the Board on the 6th day of every month of all the potatoes shipped by him during the previous month, and to remit to the Board the amount so collected. "The plaintiff, according to the Board, had not complied with Order No. 2, and for that reason his license was revoked. The plaintiff claims that these two Orders (Nos. 2 and 6) were beyond the powers of the Board, and being illegal, could not be enforced by the Board. This question was considered by the Supreme Court in Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board v. H. B. Willis Inc. and Attorney-General of Canada (1952 4 D.L.R. page 146). In the headnote of the case it is stated: "Moreover, the Potato Board in making orders in pursuance of the Scheme acts beyond provincial legislative competence in imposing a levy on potato dealers and producers which amount to indirect taxation and to regulation of extra-provincial trade. "The Board had no power according to this decision to make Orders Nos. 2 and 6, and consequently they are invalid."

Validity of Cancellation "The question now arises as to the validity of the Order of cancellation of license made by the Board on the 9th March. According to subsection (D) (1) of Section 16 of the Scheme, and Section 5 of Order No. 1, the Board had power to cancel any license for violation of any provision of the Scheme or of any Order of the Potato Board or of any of its regulations. The plaintiff, so far as the record shows, had complied with all valid conditions of the Board, and, such being the case, had the Board power to cancel his license arbitrarily and without valid reason therefor? "Counsel have not given me any authorities on this point, but in my opinion the case of Hurst v. Picture Theatres, Limited, decided in the Court of Appeal in England in 1914 has some similarity. This case is reported in 1915 1 K.B.D. page 1, and the headnote reads as follows: "The purchaser of a ticket for a seat at the theatre or other similar entertainment has a right to stay and witness the whole of the performance, provided that he be-

has properly and complies with the rules of the management. The license granted by the sale of the ticket includes a contract not to revoke the license arbitrarily during the performance. Where therefore the plaintiff, who had purchased a ticket for a seat at a cinema show, was forcibly turned out of his seat by the direction of the manager, who was acting under a mistaken belief that the plaintiff had not paid for his seat:— Held by Buckley, L.J., and Kennedy, L.J. (Pullinover L.J. dissenting), that in an action for assault and false imprisonment the plaintiff was entitled to recover substantial damages. Wood v. Leadbitter (1845) 13 N. W. 838 discussed, Decision of Channell J. affirmed."

No Authority To Cancel "In the case at Bar, the plaintiff had not violated any provision of any valid order, and, in my opinion, the Board had no authority to cancel the license. The license, on its face, expressly stated that it did not expire until the 30th day of June, 1951, and until that date or until it was legally cancelled, the plaintiff had a right to buy, sell and market potatoes in conformity with the provisions of the P.E.I. Marketing Scheme. Consequently, the plaintiff had a right to enter into the contract in writing with the defendant dated the 19th day of April, 1951, and insofar as this contract is concerned, the defense fails. "The other contracts between the parties were made on the 4th day of July 1951 and on the 23rd day of August, 1951. The plaintiff's license to deal in potatoes expired on the 30th day of June 1951 and a new license was not issued to him for the year beginning July 1, 1951 until Nov. 17, 1951. According to Sec. 18 of the Order-in-Council of 5th Sept. 1950, and Sec. 1 of Order No. 1, every person who buys, sells or transports potatoes produced in the province requires a license issued by the Potato Board, and no person shall buy, sell or offer for sale or otherwise deal in potatoes produced in the area unless he is in possession of such license. Cases Cited "On this point the defendant's counsel cited me many cases including Cope v. Rowlands, 2 M & W 149 Eng. Rep. 707, Parke B. at page 710 says: "The decision was delivered by Parke, B. who said: "It is perfectly settled, that where a contract which the plaintiff seeks to enforce, be it express or implied, is expressly or by implication forbidden by the common or statute law, no Court will lend its assistance to give it effect. It is equally clear that a contract is void if prohibited by a statute, though the statute inflicts a penalty only, because such a penalty implies a prohibition: Lord Holt, Bartlett v. Vinor (e). And it may be safely laid down, notwithstanding some dicta apparently to the contrary, that if the contract be rendered illegal, it can make no difference, as a point of law, whether the statute which makes it so has in view the protection of the revenue, or any other object."

Plaintiff's Contention "All the other cases cited are to the same effect and nothing to the contrary has been shown, so that the law in this matter appears to be well settled. "Counsel for the plaintiff contends, however, that the Board had no right to refuse a license to his client after the expiration of the first one on 30th June 1951. He states that the plaintiff made repeated applications to the manager of the Board for a new license and that he was refused. He states that there was a dispute about the amount due the Board under the levy, and that the new license was refused for this reason. He claims that, since the levy was illegal, the license should have been granted by the Board and the plaintiff should not suffer because the Board acted illegally. "While there may be merit in this contention, it does not help the plaintiff here since the regulations prohibit him from entering into a contract without a license. "The contracts entered into on the 4th day of July, 1951 and 23rd day of August, 1951, are, in my opinion, illegal and void and cannot be enforced."

Counsel appearing in the case were Mr. D. O. Stewart, Q.C., for the plaintiff, and Hon. W. E. Darby, Q.C., for the defendant.

Beaver Inroads Forces Action By Government

The constant and expanding inroads by beavers on valuable timber lots and the damage done by water when dammed up by these industrious workers, has caused Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources to declare an open season on the offenders for a more or less indefinite period. Mr. Cullen said yesterday that culverts were being dammed up and important roads flooded in the Peake's Station and Vernon River areas to the extent that conditions which were only costly now to remedy, might even become dangerous if unchecked. "We tried to curtail this menace last year," said the Minister, "by issuing temporary trappers licences but without achieving the desired effect. "The possibility of creating a sanctuary for beavers does not appear to be the remedy," he continued. According to our information, they are partial to poplar trees as a steady diet and when they have cleaned up such a grove in the vicinity of a stream, they move off to a new location and start work all over again. "The beaver does not justify his existence in this Province, all things being considered, hence the open season."
