

Ottawa Is Under Pressure On Digest, Time Exemptions

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government is under strong pressure from within to withdraw its proposed exemption of Time and Reader's Digest from tax measures aimed at practicing Canadian periodicals, its informants said here.

It is understood government supporters as well as opposition members will publicly call on the government to drop the exemption.

The two publications, which have Canadian editions prepared partly in this country, were specifically exempted from the proposal to protect

possibility of a revised plan. There are two parts to the government's proposal to "protect" Canadian publications. One denies deductibility from corporate income for the expense of advertisements placed after Dec. 31 in non-Canadian periodicals and primarily directed to the Canadian market.

The other prohibits the importation of special issues of foreign periodicals carrying advertising directed to the Canadian market which does not appear in other issues of the same publication in its originating country.

TERMS DEFINED
A Canadian periodical is defined as one which has its editorial type set in Canada, is wholly printed in Canada and is edited in this country by Canadian residents. Such periodicals include those published at regular intervals

of more than six days and less than 15 weeks and distributed as distinct publication or as supplements to a newspaper. The government's proposed resolutions were the main recommendations of a royal commission in May 1961. However, the commission made a suggestion to exempt Time and Reader's Digest from the proposal not to permit deductions for advertising in non-Canadian periodicals.

Funds Given To Aid Youth Travel Plans

OTTAWA (CP) — Cheques to assist four more organizations to organize youth travel plans for this year in preparation for the 1967 centenary were handed over Wednesday by Prime Minister Pearson.

They were given to representatives of the Council of 4-H Clubs, the Girl Guides of Canada, Les Guides Catholiques du Canada, and the Canadian Science Fair Council.

The organizations are among 16 who will share \$100,000 of centennial commission funds this year to help in the administrative cost of existing youth travel programs, with a view

to enlarging them progressively in the next two years and to reach a climax in 1967.

Prime Minister Pearson in a statement said the travel program aims at "enhancing knowledge and fostering friendships among young Canadians from coast to coast, leading to greater understanding and unity."

OPERATES EXCHANGE
Similar cheques were turned over earlier to the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews and to Les Visites Interprovinciales. All six organizations have operated youth travel exchanges between one part of Canada and another in the past. The federal funds are to be used to expand the youth travel schemes, which operate mainly during the summer school holiday months.
