

Yankees Whip Pale Hose; Giants Defeat Reds 7-5

Chicago White Sox muffed a chance to gain on Cleveland's American League leaders Wednesday when pitcher Ray Moore made the obvious mistake of throwing a fast one down the middle to Mickey Mantle.

The Sox were trailing 3-1 in the second inning but still had a chance to pull out the decision and pick up a half game on the Indians, who were frozen out at Boston. There were two out and two on base when Mantle came to bat. Moore pitched three straight called balls, then fired his fast one.

Instead of taking it, the strategic move on a 3-0 count, Mickey did what came naturally. He swung with all his might and propelled the ball into the third deck at Yankee Stadium for a three-run homer. That made the score 6-1 and ended Moore's tenure on the mound and the Yankees went on to win 7-3.

GIANTS, CUBS WIN

In two National League day games, San Francisco Giants pounded out a 7-5 decision over Cincinnati Reds and Chicago Cubs beat Pittsburgh 5-2 on Cal Neeman's inside-the-park homer.

As a result the second-place Giants gained a full game on Pittsburgh, whose margin over Chicago was trimmed to a half game.

The Yankees' victory, earned in 56-degree weather, put them back at the 500 mark in the standings. Before Mantle's big blow, they had scored once in the first inning and two in the second, when Hector Lopez singled, Bobby Richardson tripled and Tony Kubek doubled.

Yankee hurler Bob Turley fanned six Chicago batsmen in the first two innings, but he tired and had to be replaced by Ryne Duren in the seventh inning.

Harvey Haddix, who hasn't beaten the Cubs in four attempts this season was the victim of Neeman's homer. The liner rolled past Bob Skinner to the fence and Neeman was almost to third before shortstop Dick Groat recovered the ball and made a futile effort to head him off at the plate. Neeman had singled and scored in the seventh to knot it up at 2-2.

The Giants broke their game wide open with a five-run sixth inning with Reds' starter Orlando Pena contributing three bases on balls. Homers by Jim Davenport and Daryl Spencer accounted for the other Giant runs.

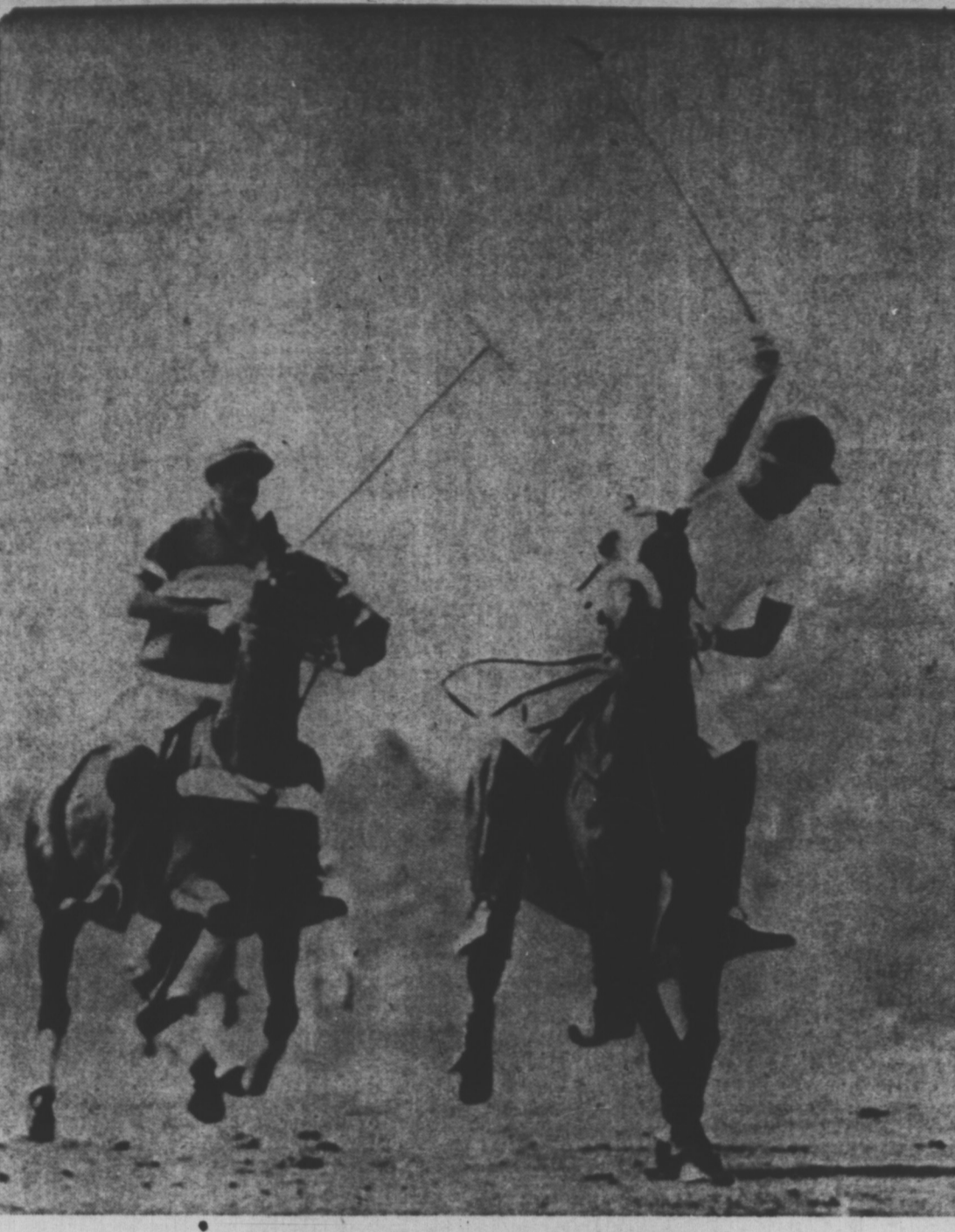

Johansson Talks Bravely Of Big Bout With Champ

GROSSINGER, N. Y. (AP)—Ingemar Johansson is as calm as a Swede sliding up to a smorgasbord. If he is worried about his June 25 title fight with heavy-weight champion Floyd Patterson it doesn't show.

The handsome challenger loafed in his plush headquarters before driving about a half mile to the training ring where he is preparing for his most important fight.

"Patterson looked much better to me in Helsinki (1952 Olympics) where Patterson won the middleweight title than he did against Brian London in Indianapolis," he said.

"I prefer a stand up fighter rather than a croucher. In the Olympics, he was a stand up fighter. He was so fast that nobody could see his punches. NOT AS FAST?"

"From what I saw in Indianapolis he is not as fast anymore. Maybe it is that style they say

his manager taught him. Whatever it is, I think he looked better seven years ago."

The challenger, a look alike to pitcher Robin Roberts of Philadelphia, was asked why he had not been knocking out sparring partners like Patterson has been doing.

"If he is so good at knocking out men, why didn't he knock out Roy Harris and London easier. It is a hard thing to take on a new man you haven't fought and knock him out. It is easy to knock out men you fight every day."

Some alert press agent had planted a story about Cus d'Amato, Patterson's manager, having a "spy" in the Johansson camp. It brought a laugh from the Swede.

"What would a spy tell Patterson?" he asked. "Sometimes I can't understand d'Amato. He can come down here with Floyd Patterson and take a seat at my side. It will not bother me at all."

Contrary to general opinion, Johansson thinks he can win the fight on a decision. He doesn't feel he has to knock out Patterson to win.

"I still say like I did when I first came over here that I can knock out any man I can hit with my right hand," he said. "And I think I can hit Patterson. Since I saw him in Indianapolis I think my chances are much better."

Last Year's Open Champs Seen Unlikely To Repeat

Canadian Press Staff Writer MONTREAL (CP)—Wes Ellis, defending champion for the Canadian Open golf title, appeared Wednesday to be becoming the forgotten man on the eve of the \$25,000, 72-hole tournament.

The tall young Texan who plays out of Aldecross, N.J., fired himself a one-over-par 73 practice round on his first appearance on the Islesmere course and wasn't particularly enthusiastic about his chances himself. He was the winner last year in Edmonton.

"It sure would be nice to repeat but I haven't been playing well for a month," said Ellis. "The course here is fine; nothing wrong about that. It's just that I haven't been playing well."

There was a growing indication that Art Wall of Pocono Manor, Pa., winner last April of the Masters, may be the man to watch for \$3,500 top prize money when the field winds up play Sunday.

AROUND PAR
Wall also had his first tryout of the Islesmere course Wednesday and, considering his experimenting, could be figured at par 72 or better.

There was talk among the touring pros that the 6,005-yard Islesmere course may not take the consistent liking that has been talked about.

The course is approaching top shape after a couple of days without rain and the ball is getting a medium roll. The weather still will be a factor.

The outlook was that today's opening round will be played in weather with plenty of sunny periods but with winds up to 20 miles an hour and gusting higher.

BEST DAY'S SCORE
The field, which was at 149 Wednesday, got in final practice round work. Best reported late in the day was a 69 by Bert Weaver of Beaumont, Texas, but most of the players were figuring out the course and playing several shots.

Bill Casper of Apple Valley, Calif., winner Sunday of the U.S. Open, shot a two-under par 70.

Casper is still looked upon by the pre-tournament galleries as the favorite.

Stan Leonard of Vancouver, still ranked as one of Canada's best bet for the title he never has won, shot an even par 72 Wednesday despite a poor start.

"I was just shadow-boxing, anyway, today," said Leonard. "The course is playing a bit longer than it did when I was here a couple of years ago. I have never seen any better greens in the Montreal area. If the weather stays this way I'm looking for about 275 to win."

RETURNS TO TOUR
Leonard said he now will return to the tour after a short lay-off and play in Chicago and Flint, Mich. He will then return home for a while and play in the Canadian Professional Golfers Association tournament in Ottawa next month.
