Fine Work Shown At Needlework Guild Display

Large quantities of fine hand-made infants' and children's garments made by the members of the Queen Mary Needlework Guild were on display yesterday at the Guild held its annual display at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Displayed with the clothing were a number of lovely Christmas cards received from Her late Majesty Queen Mary over the years from 1924 to the present, and a certificate from Queen Mary presented to the Guild in recognition of their magnificent work during the war years.

In addition to donating work to the Maternity Hospital and the Orphanage, the Guild has, during the past few weeks, collected and packed three bundles of used clothing, weighing between 30 and 40 pounds, which were sent to Toronto and Montreal for shipment to Korea. The Guild will continue to pack and ship clothing for Korean relief as it is received.

A large number attended the display yesterday, and all were warm in their praise of the wonderful work of the members, as evidenced by the great quantity of useful and carefully made articles.

Tuber Sets Menaced By Seed Corn Maggot

The seed corn maggot will often cause serious damage to potato sets after they are planted in the field, states the Weekly Bulletin of the Science Service Laboratory. These maggots may tunnel the sets so completely that they will be destroyed, but if the plants get a good start before the maggots attack the sets, they will not cause any serious harm.

The most favourable conditions for seed corn maggots is when the weather is cool and wet, especially in fields where barnyard manure has been applied just previous to planting. Sets that are cut for some time before planting and the cut surface not properly healed over will attract maggots.

To avoid this trouble plant when the ground is relatively dry and warm. If it is necessary to cut the sets several days before planting, see that the cut surfaces are healed over by spreading them out in a thin layer on the floor and turning them over several times a day. Do not plant sets showing any signs of rot.
