New Senior Citizens Home Scheduled To Open Today

The new Sacred Heart Home, designed to house some 125 of Charlottetown's senior citizens, will be officially opened this morning. Joseph Murphy, of the firm of Williams and Murphy, contractors who constructed the building, will present the keys to Bishop M.A. MacEachern to officially open the new residence. Bishop MacEachern will celebrate the first mass in the residence chapel during the morning.

The company has also undertaken urban or shopping centre development in Waterloo, North Bay and Aurora, Ont., and industrial development in the Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver areas.

The residence was designed by architects Alfred Hennessey and Peter MacNeil. It is a five-storey structure of brick and steel, fireproof and sprinkler-protected throughout. The building is serviced with elevators and all walking areas are hand-railled.

The ground level contains heating equipment, kitchen facilities, dining areas, and a storage space. A 100-seat chapel, lounges and administration offices are located on the main floor. The top three floors are divided into bed-living rooms for the residents. The rooms will be generally double occupancy, with a few privates. The third floor is devoted exclusively to accommodations for bedridden patients. The residents will begin moving from the old Sacred Heart Home in to the beautiful new residence in early October.

Bank-Owned Canadian Firm's Giant In Real Estate

HALIFAX (CP) — Last week as a big one in the brief history of Webb and Knapp (Canadian Ltd.), a worldwide organization that in less than seven years has become Canada's biggest real estate developer. On Tuesday William Zeczen, chairman and chief executive officer, opened the company's 100,000 Halifax shopping centre, the largest in the Atlantic provinces. Two days later in Montreal opened the \$105,000,000 Place de Marie development, largest downtown renewal project in Canadian history. The Halifax enterprise, he said, confirms Webb and Knapp a genuine trans-Canada operator. They opened a \$10,000,000 shopping centre in the skirts of Vancouver last week. But the giant Montreal project, biggest the company has bid, signifies triumph over cities who four years ago predicted it would ever be done.

STARTED IN 1955
Webb and Knapp (Canada) Ltd., a subsidiary of Zeczen's Webb and Knapp Inc. of New York, was incorporated in Canada in November, 1955. Today the Canadian organization planning, designing, building, leasing, and managing large scale real estate developments from coast to coast. It has well over \$200,000,000 worth of projects completed or under way and the figure is growing rapidly. Place Ville Marie is the corporation that started Zeczen in this country in 1955. He is already a world figure in an redevelopment in Montreal. He wanted to do something in an excavated property in Montreal's central station, now known as the "dorchestrest hole." Among his achievements outside Canada have been assembling the East River site in New York that became the new Nations headquarters, a renewal project in New York, Washington, Chicago, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, a municipal commercial development in Denver and Los Angeles.

UNMATCHED
Canadian projects are on a scale unmatched in this country. Place Ville Marie comprises a 42-storey Royal Bank Canada building, a second line completed a shopping centre, and two more buildings to come. It is the largest urban commercial development in the Commonwealth. In the Commonwealth, a \$100,000,000-acre residential, industrial and commercial estate developed on the edge of Toronto is planned to accommodate 20,000 people by 1968 in a residential area, not to mention an industrial park, an office campus, a shopping centre. The 83-acre site bought by the firm for the English-language headquarters. At the end of August 640 housing units were finished. In the Toronto area, at least, Canada's largest residential shopping centre is scheduled for completion by the end of the year at a reported cost of \$200,000,000. It will have about 100,000 sq. ft. of retail space including Eaton's and other major retailers.

OPERATING CENTRES
Webb and Knapp shopping centres are already operating in 11,000,000, Wellington Centre in London, Ont., 1,000,000 in Westwood, Cambridge, B.C., and the 100 Halifax stores opened
