

## Women Add Glitter To Parliament

OTTAWA (CP)—The House of Commons may be pretty much of a man's world but it's women who add much of the glitter to the formal opening of each session.

The 25th opening session today will be no exception. During the Second World War years and the post-war period, openings tended to be rather drab. But since Queen Elizabeth opened parliament in 1957, women have made the openings an occasion to wear colorful gowns and furs.

Mme. Georges Vanier, wife of the governor-general, plans to wear a period-style gown of turquoise slipper satin and silver accessories.

Mrs. John Diefenbaker, wife of the prime minister, has chosen a sapphire blue velvet gown with a fitted bodice and a slightly flared skirt which she will wear with white fox furs.

Mrs. Lester B. Pearson, wife of the opposition leader, has chosen a gold and black brocade gown on slim lines with a side drape and gold accessories.

The six women senators will be scattered among the senators who sit in the first two rows of the maroon-covered benches on both sides of the governor-general. The women senators are Mrs. Mariama Jodoin, Mrs. Muriel Ferguson, Mrs. Nancy Hodges, Mrs. Elsie Inman, Mrs. Olive Irvine and Mrs. Josie Quart.

## Fish Mission Plane Tour Of Europe

OTTAWA (CP)—A seven-man frozen fish trade mission leaves here Friday on a five-week tour of Europe to study market possibilities for Canadian frozen fish.

Trade Minister Hees announced Wednesday that representatives of the industry from Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, Quebec and British Columbia, along with a representative of the Canadian Labor Congress and the federal Fisheries department, will bring back a report on European market possibilities to the Canadian fishing industry.

Mr. Hees said the delegates will visit leading importers of fisheries products, government fisheries officers, and study processing methods in the various countries. They will also visit salt fish plants.

The statement said that sales of frozen cod fillets and blocks in Britain last year increased to 7,000,000 pounds from 1,100,000,000 in 1960. Removal of import restrictions in 1962 were said to be the reason for the increasing sales in that country.

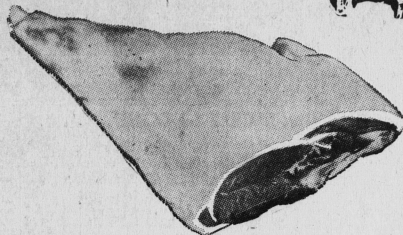
