ATHLETIC SPORTS YESTERDAY

Names of the Winners in the Different Events.

Although the absence of foreign competitors lessened somewhat the interest in the races yesterday and, probably, the attendance, the races were very exciting and splendidly contested. The time made was in most cases excellent, and rarely uninterestingly slow. The fine sportsmanship of the competitors, the propitious weather, and the good management all concurred to true sport. But twice were there accidents,—one from exhaustion in running, and the other by a bicycle collision. Most of the riders did well in competition with their associates; but how much better they should have done pitted against outsiders is too well known. A lamentable feature of the day was Newsome's inability to appear in most of the events he had entered owing to illness.

Shortly before two o'clock the 1-mile novice was called, and Martin, Doyle, Gaudet, Sellar, McDonald, Hughes and Reid lined up. This race passed off without accident until the beginning of the last lap when Sellar in attempting to pass Gaudet collided with him, and a fall was the consequence. McDonald captured the race, and Reid got second place. Time 2:50.

Half mile bicycle race—This was raced in one heat owing to the absence of most of those entered and had a time limit of 1:25. Unsworth, P. Brown, L. Large and B. Brown started. Large had the lead throughout, and won in 1:19. P. Brown was second.

220 yards run—Ritchie and Duffy were the only starters. Ritchie captured the lead at the start and kept it, winning by about three yards. Time 24 2/5.

One mile bicycle race.—Cook, Unsworth, and P. Brown started in the first heat of the one mile, (time limit 2:50). They rode together, making alternate pace till the last lap. Brown won with Unsworth second. Time 2:45. In the second heat, Large, Gaudet, and Byron Brown started. Brown won with Large second. Time 2:38. The final was raced by Unsworth, Large, P. Brown and Byron Brown. This was one of the best races of the day, and was very cleverly manoeuvred. B. Brown won in a splendid spurt, with Unsworth second and Large third. Time 2:41.

In the one mile bicycle race for boys under 15 W. Brown, Pownall, Hughes, Doyle, Martin, competed. Doyle won, Hughes getting second place. Time 2:51 4/5.

Sealed distance race. This race resembled an amusement race in some respects. Cook and Unsie vied for the coveted first place which went to the latter. The distance was a mile. Time 3:28 1/5.

440 yards run.—D. McKinnon, P. Duffy and Ritchie started. Duffy won, Ritchie second. At the finish of this race Ritchie collapsed from exhaustion. Time 54 2/5.

Two mile bicycle race, lap—Newsome, Gaudet, Unsworth and Cooke started. Cooke secured first place by one point, Newsome 2nd, Unsworth 3rd. Gaudet captured time prize, crossing the line first on last lap. Time 5:52 2/5.

Half mile bicycle race, against time—Newsome started first, paced by Large in first quarter and Gaudet in second. Time 1:07 1/5. Byron Brown was paced by Sellar and Clarke on a tandem. Time 1:08 4/5. Picton Brown was paced by Unsworth and Cook on a tandem, making the half in 1:05. The last quarter was done in 29 sec. Large started twice, but did not finish. Picton Brown thus won the race, Newsome second.

880 yards run.—D. A. McKinnon and P. Duffy started. McKinnon won by ten yards. Time 2:13 2/5.

The five mile bicycle—Massey Harris Trophy—was raced by Newsome, Large and Picton Brown. It was won by Brown in handsome style, Newsome a close second. Time 15:12 4/5.

Another race between Large and Brown was won by the latter in 1:25.
