Let's Talk It Over

That eerie, spine-tingling, but altogether delightful and enchanted evening for youth is just around a couple of corners. Which of you old-timers does not recall through the mist of the years the pleasurable anticipation that ran through your veins during the last weeks of October for that night of nights, Halloween. Early in the evening there was bobbing of apples, and other parlor games with a special Halloween flavor. Then you went out into a night filled with strange looking characters that surpassed any assemblage gathered in the water-front dens of iniquity in Shanghai. Clothed in the anonymity of ill-fitting clothes and a mask you played practical jokes on your neighbours. Most of them took it all in fun, but occasionally someone a little more brittle of temper than the others "hit the roof". Mostly this display of irascibility added to, rather than subtracted from the enjoyment of the evening.

There was always, even in those days as there is now, a rather thin division between the harmless tricks that caused your neighbour some slight inconvenience, but no real damage, and the acts of "w" destruction of property which are as inexcusable on Halloween night as on any other night of the year. It is important that young people be able to distinguish between the two, and during these pre-Halloween days of gleeful planning and preparation it might be well for teachers and parents to try to make children under their charge conscious of the very clear difference between the two.

If the victim is none of the worse the following morning, the prank was probably inoffensive. But if he has suffered a real loss through breakage or other damage of property, the Halloween jinks went a bit too far. Our Summerside fishermen put on an annual "show for the kiddies which helps to show the small fry that heaps of fun can be had without causing anyone else pain.

At the present time there are 54 credit unions in Prince Edward Island with a combined membership of approximately 10,000 persons. His fishing boat as later salvaged without serious damage from the pounding surf.

Lobster Fishermen Continued from page 1 wear and tear. This would give him compensation of \$500.

Mr. Winters, who in addition to being Minister of Public Works is at present acting Minister of Fisheries, believes that the majority of lobster fishermen in the designated areas will take advantage of the new storm insurance plan. Other types of insurance for damages are as follows:

1. For traps with an average value of from five to seven dollars, the premium is twenty cents a trap and the recovery rate three dollars per trap.

2. For traps valued at from three to five dollars, the premium is thirteen cents per trap and the recovery rate two dollars per trap.

3. For traps valued at from two to three dollars. The premium is eight and a half cents per trap and the recovery rate a dollar and twenty-five cents per trap. No provision is made for lobster traps valued at less than two dollars apiece. On the other hand, fishermen whose traps have high value, will be allowed to take any coverage he feels might meet his needs.

One explanation of the low acceptance of the former trap insurance plan in the Northumberland Strait area, a department spokesman said, is that this is one of the safest areas in the Maritimes and damage is apt to be smaller there than on more exposed coasts.

Murray has shown a great interest in the girls' team, and although their record last year did not resemble that of the famed Edmonton Grads, still the girls had a lot of fun. Murray's quiet trouble seems to be that girls showing a preference for the sport seem, with few exceptions, to be built rather close to the ground. If there are any five foot six-to-ten co-eds with a hankering for sports, we feel sure Mr. Murray would be delighted to give them a trial, and try to teach them the rudiments of the game.

It is to be devoutly hoped that the management of the Charlottetown Islanders will have a clear, indisputable claim to all the players who perform with them this year. All these ownership tangles should be ironed out as soon as possible, and not left until playoffs or time rolls around. The Erwin Grosse affair last spring was a very sad one, and we think someone blundered badly to allow such a situation to develop so late in the season.

Paul Schurman, Ron MacArthur, Coke Grady have been practicing all week with Bucko Trainer's Islanders. Whether the boys make the team or not, they should profit from the workous under the tutelage of Trainer. They are almost bound to pick up some new hockey savvy playing beside such players as Gustavsson, Whitlock, Gray, and Bucko himself.

Some grabbed rocks. Others loosened the fence posts. When the Indians rushed in tear gas equipment, the North Koreans calmly retired to their tents, closed the flaps carefully to keep out the gas and waited for a charge that never came.

When the Indian command declared that use of force probably would result in "extremely heavy casualties," the Indian-led neutral command cancelled the explanations for the day.

Continued from page 1 on Canadian potatoes by the United States Government should this pool plan lead to dumping P. E. I. seed and table potatoes on American markets at extremely low prices.

"This fear is increased by recent United States action in regard to Canadian dairy and pork products. The meeting felt that Government aid is not required at this season of the year as the outlook for the marketing of the potato crop at fair prices is good, as experienced dealers think that this year's crop in this Province is down from 2,000 to 2,500 cars from last year, as indicated according to the yield being harvested. Reports from other parts of Canada show that the situation is practically the same, with reports of late Ontario crop indicating a drop of as much as 35 to 50 percent."

Town Council Approves Plans For New Arena

After examining specifications submitted by Mr. Harold Gaudet, president of the Summerside Trotting Association, the Summerside Town Council at a special meeting last evening approved plans for the new arena that the association propose to build in Summerside.

Providing the plans are approved by the Provincial cabinet, Mr. Gaudet said the final decision will be made on Tuesday evening after the association have received construction estimates from the M. F. Schurman Company who prepared the plans, and who, it is expected will be the construction contractors.

Providing that decision is made, it is expected that work will commence on Thursday morning.

The plans submitted and approved by the council call for the construction of a steel frame building 240 feet long and 140 feet wide. It will carry a wooden roof of an area of 36,000 square feet, which will require two full carloads of asbestos shingles to cover.

The front of the building will be of brick face or tile, and the sides and back will be covered with a metallic-like, grey asbestos siding.

The interior of the building, which is to be used as an artificial ice-skating rink, a general physical fitness centre, and an agricultural exhibition building, will have an "ice space" 85 by 190 feet.

A promenade space for approximately 1000 persons will be located behind raised rows of seats that will provide seating accommodation for some 2000 persons, and sufficient space will still be available for the extension of the seating accommodation at any time.

Dressing rooms, canteen, and ticket office will all be located at the main entrance end of the building, and will all be heated by a hot air furnace in addition to the main door, 5 additional exits will permit an orderly flow of patrons from the building at the conclusion of any entertainment.

The area beneath the seats and promenade will provide a space 16 feet wide extending around both sides and the far end of the building, and this space will be used for various exhibition purposes, while the centre of the rink will provide show ring space for the judging and exhibiting of livestock, which will be housed in a stable building or buildings to be built on the west side of the arena building.

Summertime sport of roller-skating, dancing, etc., will be made possible by the use of special flooring.

Don MacNeill Leading Driver At Summerside

Mr. Don MacNeill of Summerside, with 252 points was leading driver at the Summerside Raceway this past season, according to an announcement made by track officials yesterday. Mr. MacNeill had 23 first place wins to his record, and came through in second place on 21 occasions. He placed third in 10 races, fourth in 8, and seventh in 5. He was in the money in 69 races and failed to collect on only 12 occasions.

Mr. George Sobey, of Summerside, was in second place for driving honors, with 204 points. Mr. Earl Semple of Kensington, was third, with 198.

Mr. Ed. Gougan of Moncton, was fourth with 147. And Mr. Roach MacGregor of Charlottetown, was fifth with 108. The horse "Headway", owned and driven by Mr. James Given of Halifax, went the fastest mile for the season on the Summerside track with a speed of 2:08 2/5.

Approximately 700 horses competed in the 22 racing meets held on this track during the season, and approximately \$40,000 was paid out in purses to winning horses.—S
