New Perth Citizens Take Steps To Preserve Old Landmark

Travellers on the highway from Charlottetown to Montague have been puzzled by a stone structure rising out of the hillside at the 18 Mile Brook in New Perth. Conjectures ranging all the way from the Tomb of an Indian chief to the entrance of a French fort have been voiced, all of which serve to demonstrate that what may be a mystery today was commonplace seventy years ago.

In that era the soil of Prince Edward Island was—as it still is—acid and required treatment to neutralize the acidity. The petrod referred to was the age of the wooden schooner and transportation thereby of Island produce to other parts of the Maritime area. DOUBLE PURPOSE

These schooners returned to their home ports or wharves ballasted with limestone quarried from the hills of Nova Scotia. From the wharves in the horse-drawn carts and wagons of the day the lime rock was hauled inland to be piled for the process which would make it suitable for application to the soil and the correction of the acidity. Above referred to.

In many parts of the province on steep hillsides appeared structures of red Island sandstone and native brick, these were the lime kilns of the day and the answer to the puzzle referred to in our opening paragraph. BUILT IN 1889

The kiln in question located on property now owned by Mr. John Lewis was built in 1889 by stonemason Wm. Lewis of Cardigan for Daniel Stewart, Esq.

The kiln may best be described as a brick lined circular stone fireplace from ten to fifteen feet deep, open at the top and with an entrance at the bottom through which the fire could be lighted and the burnt limestone removed.

A metal grating located near the bottom of the kiln served to support the alternate layers of coal and limestone with which the kiln was filled. Once the kiln was lighted the operation could be a continuous one with coal and stone being added at the top and

Baptists Meet

WOLFVILLE, N.S. (CP)—Maritime Baptist women gave \$112,500 to missions this year. It was reported here Wednesday during opening business sessions of the Maritime United Baptist Women's Missionary Societies.

General treasurer Mrs. E. H. Hunt of Saint John, N.B., said the year's expenditures were \$109,000, including grants to foreign and home missions.

Business sessions of the Maritime United Baptist Institute also opened here Wednesday, presided over by Rev. Donald McClure of East Point, P.E.I.

ADJACENT KILN

As already indicated that few lime kilns now remain, but curiously, hardly more than two hundred yards away from the first one stands a kiln which must surely qualify as one of the best ever constructed in the province and certainly as, in point of condition, bordering on the perfect.

This kiln was constructed in 1908 by Wm. Moar, who still operates the large farm on which it is located.

Mr. Moar was adept as a farmer, carpenter, carriage builder, blacksmith general mechanic and the kiln which he built proves that he mastered the art of masonry as well, as the kiln after 50 years is in excellent condition.

CATHEDRAL-LIKE Rising out of the hillside in almost Cathedral-like proportions every stone is perfectly dressed and even the sloping sides of the entrance are faced with stone.

The interior is lined with many thousands of island brick in such a manner as to produce the egg shape which was the hallmark of the ideal kiln.

Those who admire thorough workmanship and appreciate fine masonry will be quick to realize that Mr. Moar's kiln can stand for many years to come as a monument to the agricultural past and as a symbol of the solid enduring workmanship which characterized the efforts of many early Prince Edward Island farmers.

C. N. R. Has Net July Deficit

MONTREAL (CP)—The Canadian National Railways Thursday announced net operating deficit of \$381,000 for July, 1957, compared with a net operating income of \$6,507,000 in the corresponding month last year.
