

General Political Greed Said To Election Reason

Liberal political greed was the only reason for the coming federal election, Heath MacQuarrie, Progressive Conservative candidate, told a meeting in his home district of Victoria last night.

Speaking to a crowd of about 140 persons, Mr. MacQuarrie said the dissolution of parliament resulted in the loss of "excellent legislation".

He noted that the federal government had made possible local progress through its 50 per cent matching grants for resources program. He stated that government grants to the province for the past year had totalled from five and one-quarter million dollars in 1967 to 13.6 million in 1968.

Other speakers were Hon. J. Angus MacLean and Frank Murray, M.L.A. Chairman was a Wilfrid Grandy.

Mr. MacQuarrie said Canada's economy is booming under the present government. Mr. MacLean said he compared the Liberal record while in power to the party's promises of "despair" made in the current campaign.

He also praised the work of his colleague, Mrs. MacQuarrie. Mr. Myers asked for the support of Queens voters for the party's candidate.
