(AP)—Masters champion Jack Nicklaus, playing with all the emotion of a man mourning the loss, tucked away his \$60,000 tournament of Champions Sunday with a final round three-under-par 69 and a 72-hole total of 273. Picketing the top money of the year, Nicklaus, 34, was the 11th annual desert classic, the medicalized 29-year-old slammer virtually holed in five strokes in front of the delirating tournament.

Metts, Giants Split Bill; Pirates Retain L Lead

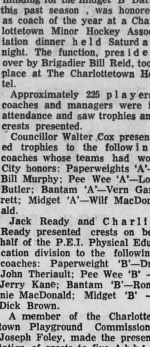

The newly New York Mets and St. Louis' split with Cincinnati, Pittsburgh retained a four-percentage point lead 4-2 after losing the opener 6-3 before 53,880, the season's largest crowd.

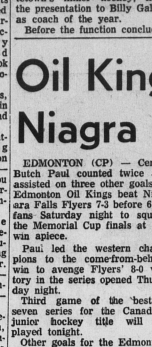

Fifth Choice Chateaugay Wins Kentucky Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Outsider, the 1955 Derby winner, Chateaugay overhauled the pace-setting Never Bend in the home stretch Saturday and drew off to a surprising victory in the 1 1/4 mile Kentucky Derby. The favorite, Candy Spots, finished third.

With a crowd estimated at more than 100,000 roaring, Chateaugay pounded past the finish line 1/4 lengths ahead of Never Bend, who held on to the runner-up spot by a neck.
Candy Spots.
No Robbery, who was supposed to have made up the Big Three along with Candy Spots and Never Bend, straggled home fifth in the field of nine three-year-olds. Both No Robbery and Candy Spots previously were undefeated.

Chateaugay, owned by John W. Galbreath of Columbia, O., is the chestnut son of Nicklaus, the nearest to him at that time, when he bowed out. It cost Casper what appeared to be an excellent chance for the second place prize.
The only Canadian in the field, Nicklaus, who led from the first round on, played Sunday's round in an almost exact 35-34. His 273 was bettered only by the 262 tournament record of 288 set by Jerry Barber in 1960 and led by Sam Snead in 1961.
"I yielded better golf for tea to anyone at all at Masters but I putted better here," Nicklaus said.
Playing his tournament for the first time, Nicklaus started the round on a windless day and struck in five of his eight, five ahead of Bob Goaly, six ahead of Palmer and eight ahead of Lema.

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
