HALIFAX, Nov. 27.—(CP)—Official forecasts issued tonight by the Dominion Public Weather Office at Halifax.

Sky is generally overcast and in Southwest Nova Scotia and New Brunswick there was rain. At Yarmouth over three inches of rain fell in the last twenty-four hours and Saint John had almost two inches. In contrast, Liverpool and Moncton had less than half an inch, while Halifax and Charlottetown reported none at all.
