WMS Rally At Breadalbane

Dr. Florence J. Murray, medical missionary from Korea, was the special speaker at a well-attended W. M. S. Rally held on Wednesday afternoon in the Breadalbane United Church, Mrs. Frank Cutcliffe presided and the opening worship was conducted by Mrs. Lindsay Sharpe, Mrs. Keith Mayne and Mrs. Sutherland Mackay of the Summerfield Auxiliary with Mrs. Clark Harding at the organ.

A welcome to the visitors was extended by Mrs. Kenneth Doull of Breadalbane and Mrs. Clifford Matheson of Hunter River graciously replied. Miss Mary Graham brought greetings from the Presbyterian Church while Mrs. Newson of the Christian Church offered prayer. After the singing of the theme hymn, "Come, Holy Spirit, Heavenly Dove", Mrs. J. S. MacLeod called the roll of Auxiliaries. A solo, "A Little Bit of Love", by Mrs. Sam Gillespie, with Mrs. James Snowie at the organ, was much appreciated. The Christian Stewardship Secretary, Mrs. J. F. Scott, made an appeal for an extra effort so that this Presbyterian might contribute to Gifts for Building Advance. The financial statement, submitted by the treasurer, Mrs. MacLeod, showed a little increase over last year's givings at the same time.

Far East Missions

In beginning her address Dr. Florence Murray said she would answer some questions regarding missions: Missionaries in China are still on salary from the home church, but the Chinese government does not wish them to accept money for the mission. They are allowed to return home on furlough but hitherto have not been permitted to return. Speaking about Japan, where she spent three weeks, she said that the proud Japanese are humiliated and dejected and that a unique opportunity is open to the West to present a new way of life to these people who are eagerly seeking a change.

Answering a question on what kind of missionaries were needed she said not only ministers, deaconesses, doctors and nurses, but all trained people, such as dietitians, lab. technicians, music, kindergarten and normal school teachers, business people, agricultural experts etc.

"The problem of Korea has existed for a long time," Dr. Murray stated, "but because little was done about it, it has now become a world problem." Korea is a small, mountainous country, very over-populated, where extreme poverty exists. The average size farm is about one half an acre. When Korea was divided following the past war and the north came under Communist influence all coal and electric power was diverted from the south to Siberia, leaving South Korea without either fuel or power. Persecution of the Christians in the north means that millions became refugees in the south where forty new congregations were set up. Under such conditions the Communists endeavoured to win recruits for Communism, but the greater percentage of Koreans are anti-communist.

Need Of Workers

"There is a great need for many more workers to tell of Christianity," said Dr. Murray. "In our territory of two provinces with two million people, there were only nine Christian missionaries, the entire staff sent from Canada. For a country that can send ten thousand to fight, Canada should be able to send many more to spread peace." She challenged the women in her audience to present the need to the young people to go as ambassadors of peace to this needy part of the world.

"One of the most effective ways of preaching the gospel is by sending relief supplies," continued the speaker, "our religion must be concerned with bodies as well as souls, the two go together." She also suggested that we try to promote international friend-

ships and good will by making an effort to have our country admit students from those backward nations to study trades and observe democracy at work. Both Great Britain and United States have put on a campaign to help such people by a system of scholarships and she felt Canada would do well to follow their example. She closed by saying: "Everyone has time for what they want to do. Each of us has twenty-four hours in a day and it is up to us to decide what we will do with it."

The solo, "Brighten the way with a smile," by Mrs. L. M. Callbeck, accompanied by Miss Mary Geldart, was well received. The offering, taken by Mrs. Lawrence Newson and Mrs. J. J. MacLeod, was dedicated by Mrs. Aubrey Cutcliffe.

The meeting closed with the hymn, "We Have Heard the Joyful Sound", and benediction by Rev. W. B. MacPhail. Lunch was served by the Breadalbane Ladies' Aid.—S.

LLOYD WINSTON DUNSFORD

The community of West Royalty and vicinity was shocked and saddened when it was known on Sept. 13 that Lloyd Winston Dunsford, son of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Dunsford had passed away in the P. E. Island Hospital at the early age of 10 years. Winston developed an infected knee earlier in the summer and had been home only a few days after five weeks in hospital. He seemed improved in health and thought to be on the way to recovery but God willed otherwise and on the morning of Sept. 13 he lapsed in unconsciousness and was rushed to the P. E. Island Hospital where he died a few hours later.

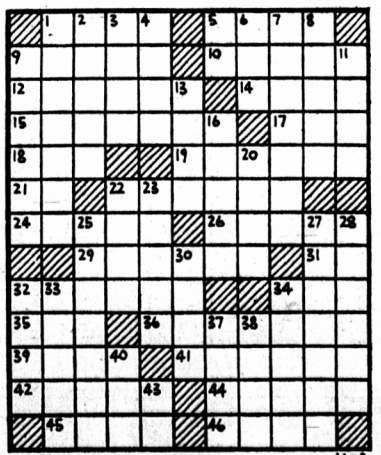

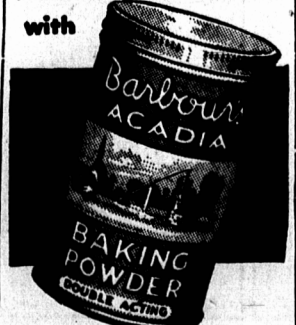
