

**Pensioners
Get Boost
This Month**

J. E. Green, regional director of Old Age Security, said yesterday that some 7,700 pensioners in the province will receive an increase of \$10 when they collect their old age security cheques for October.

The increase will result in a boost of \$77,000 to the department monthly, or \$953,000 annually.

As from Oct. 1, the total old age security payments issued each month in Prince Edward Island will be approximately \$377,200, with the annual total being \$4,526,400. This amount, combined with annual family allowance payments of \$3,200,000 brings the total amount of direct federal social security payments in this province to \$10,230,000.

**Boswell To Report
On Allied Youth**

Representing the Atlantic Provinces, David Boswell, provincial director of alcohol studies, will report to the annual meeting of the Canadian Federation of Alcohol Problems in Edmonton, Alta., on Allied Youth activities in this region.

**TCH Improvement
Completed Soon**

The resurfacing and widening of the Trans-Canada Highway between Borden and Southey is expected to be completed in about three weeks, Highways Minister Philip Mackinnon, said yesterday.

"It all depends on the weather," he said. "The three contractors, each doing a 7.5-mile section of the highway, have made excellent progress and if the weather stays dry, the project may be completed in three weeks" he added.

On the 22.5-mile section of highway, shoulders have been raised, four to eight inches of new pavement laid, and creeper lanes, to allow fast-moving vehicles to pass on hills, have been installed.

**Incinerator
Steel Awaited**

Construction of the city's teepee type incinerator has gone through the initial stages of setting the foundation, and is ready for the steel, which is being supplied and erected by the Robb Engineering Works of Amherst.

It is expected, City Engineer Norman Stewart said yesterday, that the Amherst firm will be on the job the latter part of this month, or possibly sometime during the first few days of November.

The old city dumping ground, which presented many problems during the years that it was in use, was located on a part of what was the old Kensington Rifle Range property. The new one is being built on a piece of ground the provincial government has deeded to the city from an unused portion of the Falconwood Farm property.
