Cliff Lumsden Completes Gruelling 32 Mile Swim

TORONTO (CP)—Bone-chilled Cliff Lumsden of New Toronto, the only survivor of a starting field of 30, completed the gruelling 32-mile lakelront marathon at 9 p.m. EDT (10 p.m. ADT) Friday night.

It took him 19 hours, 48 minutes and nine seconds to cover the distance.

His swim, made in frigid Lake Ontario water ranging from 54 to 60 degrees and in the teeth of a stiff northeast wind for half the distance, brought him fame and a fair amount of a jackpot of at least \$25,000.

A top-rated contender when the \$25,000 CNE marathon started at 2:30 a.m. EDT, the powerfully-built swimmer stroked into the lead from the gun, leaving behind a trail of pulled-out swimmers, including six women, who had their hopes dashed by the teeth-chattering cold and choppy waters.

Some were unconscious. Others cried with pain from leg cramps and the numbing cold.

The water temperature was 56 degrees when the field dived in and within hours it dropped to 54 degrees. At day break temperatures were 60 and they held to this most of the day and early evening.

Only 500 persons saw the start. By nightfall, thousands of persons had gathered at the waterfront to cheer Lumsden on his way.

The big crowd shouted "Go, C." to the gallant swimmer throughout the afternoon and evening.

Bay State Pat, Andrew Perry's horse of destiny, surprised even his most faithful supporters by setting a track record of 2:02.3 at the Quebec harness racing track Thursday night.

The six-year-old pacer again broke his old record of 2:05.3 in the second dash in a 2:04.1 winning effort.

During the Old Home week meet in Charlottetown the bay gelding ran away from the big field of horses in both the free-for-all pace and the invitation pace and drew tremendous crowds to the Driving Park to watch his spectacular

finishes.

His feat marks a fitting climax to a hard struggle towards the big time of harness racing. Bay State Pat was originally trained as a trotter but after fruitless losing efforts in his earlier years he was only lightly regarded and until Mr. Perry assumed ownership was never a serious contender to crack track marks anywhere.

But since the Summerside gelding converted his prize horse to a pacer Bay State Pat has been a ball of fire and can now be ranked with the greatest horses the Maritimes has ever seen.

U.S. Captures Tuna Honors On Fish Boated Wednesday

WEDGEPORT, N. S. (CP)—The United States won the 12th international tuna tournament Friday on the strength of a 585-pound bluefin boated Wednesday, one of the two fish taken in the meet.

Venezuela also made a catch Wednesday, Thursday and Friday were fishless.

The Argentine team will long remember this tournament. Arturo L. Llavallol of Buenos Aires, captain, hooked a 65-pound beauty early Wednesday but saw it killed by a shark just as he was pulling it into the boat. Under tournament rules it didn't count.

The other four teams, the British Commonwealth, Chile, Cuba and Mexico, didn't even get a bite.

FAR AHEAD ON POINTS
Al Whisnant, Jr. of New York, hailed in the U. S. fish. Its 585 pounds were worth 1,185 points to the American team. On points, the U. S. collected one point a pound for the fish and additional bonuses of 200 points for having the largest fish of the day and meet. The U. S. split 800 points with Venezuela for the most fish of the day and week.

The 277-pound fish caught by Carlos Behrens of Caracas was worth 477 points in Venezuela.

The 12th tournament will leave two marks on the record books, neither good. This was the first year there has been two fishless days and also the worst catch on record. Last year 20 fish were caught, but only four were taken in 1953.
