Exhibition Notes.

ROOTS AND VEGETABLES.

Nothing in the exhibition attracted greater and more deserved attention than Mr. E. Bayfield's group of vegetables. The group consisted of one hundred and thirty-three distinct varieties, all grown in the open air, some of them exceedingly fine and rare, showing better than any written description the great capabilities of our soil and climate in the production of roots and vegetables.

Mr. Bayfield's exhibit of Mangel Wurtzel was exceedingly fine. For long red Mangels he drew the first prize and for Red Glob Mangels he would have also drawn first prize had not the Judges given their preference to the smaller, but still very fine Yellow Mangels, exhibited by Major Freeman. Seeing that Mangels thrive so well on the Island, and are so excellent for stock it is not strange that they are not more widely distributed.

Several groups of monster Turnips were shown, and the exhibit of potatoes was an unusual fine one. There were 80 entries of potatoes including many improved varieties. The beets, carrots, onions, cabbage, to-matoes would have done credit to any exhibition. It is curious (though not unusual) that the Judges should have awarded the first prize for the coarsest lot of to-matoes.

FRUIT.

The exhibit of fruit was small but fine. It showed that the climate of the Island is very suitable for the growth of the best varieties of apples, plums, damsons, pears, etc. Delicious bunches of grapes were exhibited by William Heard, Esq., and by C. A. Hyndman, Esq., as grown in their greenhouses.

FLOWERS.

The display of cut flowers and of plants was attractive, but did not do justice to the floral taste in the community. There were not many competitors, yet the exhibits sent in were very fine. Deserving of special notice were the fine selections of colorful plants, exhibited by Mr. Hazard and Mr. Swallow. They were fine varieties, and deservedly took the prizes. There was a very tasteful rustic-stand filled with fuschias, foliage plants, and ivy-geraniums, exhibited by Mrs. Wm. Dudd. It was one of the prettiest things at the exhibition. The pansies were particularly fine, the varieties exhibited by Miss Desbrisay being large, delicately tinged, and very handsome. The dahlias exhibited by Mrs. E. Bayfield were the best selection ever shown in the city. There was a marked improvement in the following classes:—Pansies, salpiglossis, white roses, and there was a stand of splendid mignonette. Of the geraniums, the silver leaf and the sunset varieties were creditable; but the competition in other varieties was very poor. There was not a single pelargonium in the show, and the ordinary scarlets were of a very ordinary description. This was strange, because our town can boast of one of the finest collections of geraniums in the Maritime Provinces.

THE CLOTH EXHIBIT.

The cloth exhibited by Messrs. Reid Bros., of Truro, by the Charlottetown Woollen Factory Co., and by the Mills Valley Mills Co., reflected credit upon the exhibitors and upon the Province. Messrs. Reid Bros. exhibited seventy-five different patterns, the Charlottetown Factory about a hundred, and the Mills Valley Mills, forty-five. The tweeds were quite good enough to be preferred before any cloths which could possibly be imported and sold at the same prices, and they might, we think, be exported to the neighboring Provinces to compete with anything of the kind manufactured there. Some of the pieces shown by Messrs. Reid Bros. were made of wool imported from New Zealand; and its superiority in point of fineness and finish was quite evident. The question arises, "Why don't we produce fine wool as well as Australia and New Zealand?" Is there anything in our fodder or climate which prevents us from doing so? We grow not in the production of fine-wooled sheep there is yet, in this Island, large room for improvement.

DORSEY AND GOFF'S FACTORY BOOT AND SHOE EXHIBIT.

Another new thing in this year's exhibition was Messrs. Dorsey & Goff's show of boots and shoes, made at the Charlottetown Boot and Shoe Factory. There were many samples—all excellent. The exhibit must have brought forcibly to the minds of dealers the fact that it is now not necessary to go abroad for factory-made boots and shoes; for they are made right here of better quality and at cheaper rates.

PARLOR ORGANS.

Some first rate specimens of these popular instruments were on exhibition, Mr. Fletcher, Mr. Ferguson, and Miller Bros. being the exhibitors. The "Excelsior" organ, of which Mr. Ferguson is the agent, was a very good one, having purity of tone, and steady action. The other organs were first-class, and exhibited some very pretty casings. We confess to a weakness for having all the expense put into the reeds. A beautiful case is a beautiful object, but the thing seems to be a little overdone; in fact, is sometimes thought more of than the quality of tone or honesty and finish of the interior work.

PHOTOGRAPHY.

Mr. Lewis has fully redeemed the Island from the charge that a good photograph could not be produced here on account of the climate, or the sun, or some other peculiarity. His group of photographs was very fine indeed. That of our well-known townsman, Mr. Milner was "a speaking likeness" and the fancy portraits were very pretty and well finished.

AN OMISSION SUPPLIED.

From the prize list, as published in Wednesday, the following was inadvertently omitted:—Best collection of geraniums, in foliage and in flowers, Alex. Smallwood, city; 2nd best, G. H. Hazard, city.

BOOKBINDING.

Mr. G. H. Hazard exhibited specimens of bookbinding, stationery and monograms, showing strength, utility and beauty in tasteful combination. Mr. Hazard's exhibit would, we feel sure, have pleased even Oscar Wilde.

FOWLS.—A CORRECTION.

The first prize for hamburgs having been

awarded a trio of birds over one year, the correction has been made, and F. M. Lowry takes first prize, and Hugh Johnson, second, for birds exhibited in 1882.

Educational.

OUR TEACHERS UNBENDING.—ANNUAL MEETING OF THE EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION.

On Thursday and Friday the Educational Association held its meeting for this year in the Hall of the West Kent Street School. One hundred and twenty-five members were present. Queen's and Prince Counties were well represented at the meeting. There was quite a marked improvement on former years in the discussion of the papers and subjects brought before the meeting. Instead of the discussions being chiefly conducted by non-professionals, the teachers themselves discussed each paper with considerable spirit. That which excited the keenest discussion was the reference to the "bonus" clause in the School Act, made by the President in his address. Some inferred that it was the intention of the Government to repeal this clause on account of the difficulty in carrying it into successful operation with two Inspectors, a number regarded as insufficient. It was evident, however, that such a step, which probably was never contemplated, would be regarded by Teachers as a breach of good faith. The discussion on Saturday teaching, as required in the country schools, elicited but one opinion, which was an emphatic condemnation of it, not only on account of the injustice done to both teachers and scholars, but also on account of the injurious effects resulting from the practice. Papers were read by Mr. J. D. Seaman, Charlottetown; Mr. A. P. McLellan, Summerside, and Rev. K. McLennan, Charlottetown.

The reunion closed last evening, with a very pleasant musical entertainment, at which Professor Anderson presided. Miss McLeod, Mr. McLellan, Miss Belle McDonald, Miss Ackerman, and Miss Harris each sang a song, and Mr. Cutler, Mr. Matheson, Miss Ellen Lawson, Miss Barr, and Mr. T. LePage, each read or recited. Mr. Cutler is decidedly the best elocutionist we have had amongst us since Easty. Henry Lawson, Esq., delivered a short address, combating the idea that education is being too widely diffused for the good of the people. Before parting, the Association sang Auld Lang Syne and God save the Queen.

THE number of commercial failures in the United States for the past nine months shows a considerable increase over the figures in the corresponding period of last year. Throughout the country business is considered sound, and yet the liabilities are very heavy. The feverish push of the Americans is probably the cause of the trouble. A Yankee is good for anything, and has a knack of meeting, fearlessly, any obstacle. He has to suffer for it sometimes. Over-trading and over-speculation are the prevailing tendencies, and these cause many mis-haps. Business men, wishing to carry on their work cannot fail to learn the lesson of caution, and to study well and be guided by the true principals of trade.

IN THE SUPREME COURT.

In the matter of An Act of the Parliament of Canada, passed in the forty-fifth year of Her present Majesty's reign, Chapter 23, intitled, "An Act respecting Insolvent Banks, Insurance Companies, Loan Companies, Building Societies, and Trading Corporations, and of the President, Directors, and Company of the Bank of Prince Edward Island, an Insolvent Banking Company.

UPON the application of the Liquidators of the above-named Banking Company and upon reading the affidavit of Lemuel Cambridge Owen, Charles Colson Gardier, and David C. Chalmers, with the Schedule thereto annexed, filed the fifteenth day of September last past, and the order made by me, dated the fifteenth day of September last, and the notice signed by the Prothonotary, issued in pursuance of such order and the affidavit of Leith E. Brocken of the due publication of such notice filed the twenty-fifth day of September last, and upon hearing counsel for the said Liquidators and counsel for several of the contributors of said Company, I do order that a first call of forty dollars per share be made on all the contributors of the said Banking Company.

And I do further order that each such contributor do, on or before the first day of December next (A. D. 1882), pay into the Bank of Nova Scotia at its Branch in Charlottetown, in said Province of Prince Edward Island, to the account of the Liquidators of the said Company the amount which will be due from him or her or them in respect of such call.

And I do also order that the further hearing of the said order granted by me on the fifteenth day of September last past, as to the further payment of said contributors of the further sum of forty dollars per share be adjourned until Monday, the eleventh day of December next, then to take place at my Chambers, in the Law Courts Building, in said Province, at the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon, and I do further order that a copy of this order, together with a notice from the Liquidators of the said Company, specifying the amount due from such contributor, in respect of such call, be served on all such contributors by posting the same in a letter prepaid and registered in the General Post Office, in Charlottetown, in said Province, addressed to the party or parties contributory, at his, her or their last known address, or place of abode, or by the delivery thereof personally, to the attorney of the party to be served.

And I do further order that a copy of this order be published in the Royal Gazette newspaper of said Province, and in THE EXAMINER and Patriot newspapers, published in Charlottetown in said Province, in the daily issues thereof, for two weeks from the date thereof.
