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C. W. L. OFFER SERVICES IN NATIONAL EMERGENCY

Though war seemed remote when the National Convention of the Catholic Women's League of Canada was held at Winnipeg in June, the situation in Europe was discussed and a unanimous resolution was passed offering the services of league members should the Government of Canada at any time require them. At a meeting of the Indian River Subdivision held on Sunday, Sept. 10th this resolution was discussed and a copy handed to each member. Following is the resolution which was endorsed at the Diocesan Convention held in Charlottetown, August 22nd to 24th. Whereas realizing as we do the horrible unrest among European countries and the threats of war that have been from time to time so alarming and further realizing that our Canadian people may be called upon at any time to serve our nation, and Whereas, we are praying that God will direct the leaders of our country to do all in their power to maintain peace and avert war, and Whereas we are banded together in the common love of God and Canada and service is our motto, in the event of our homes being in danger and our husbands, sons and brothers being obliged to take arms, Be it resolved, that we, the Catholic Women's League of Canada are prepared to join in the ranks of service, and each and all of us according to our ability, will do what lies in our strength and training to mitigate the miseries of war and hasten the day when peace and order shall be restored.

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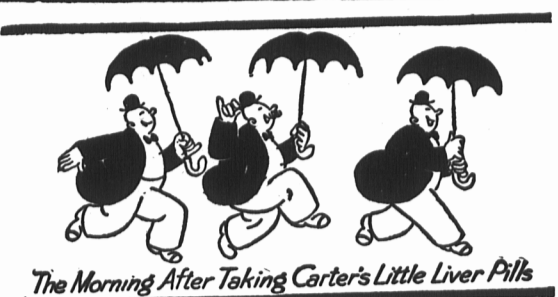
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Exhibition At Egmont Bay

Fine Entry List Features West Prince Fair - Outstanding Horse Exhibit Is Feature Event

Considerable interest was taken in the Egmont Bay Exhibition this year as it was held on the new fair grounds at Abrams Village.

The fair grounds comprise four acres of land purchased by the Exhibition Association. Commodious buildings have been erected on the grounds and the fair had a very prosperous appearance, with a record attendance.

A feature of the show this year was the outstanding exhibit of horses, the main feature of which was a pulling contest. This kept the people milling round the horse ring until late in the afternoon.

The swine exhibit was also outstanding and would invite competition at any county fair. Rev. P. X. Gallant, Honorary President presided at the opening.

Hon. Thane A. Campbell, Premier, officially opened the fair. He praised the excellent exhibits and referred to the great part that farmers play in this present world crisis.

Hon. H. W. Dennis, Minister of Agriculture, spoke and endorsed the opinions of Premier Campbell. Mr. Walter Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, raised the very high quality of farm products on exhibition. He was particularly enthusiastic of the showing of horses and swine.

Other speakers were T. M. Linkletter, M. L. L. R. Allen and B. W. Robinson, M. L. A.

The large entry of horses was judged by Prof. W. J. Read of Middleton and the exhibit, the long line of new stalls were a pleasure to visit. Noteworthy in this exhibit was the many excellent breeding stock which were shown.

The main interest centred round the horse ring, especially while the pulling contest was in progress. This was the first time such a contest was held at Egmont Bay.
