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Well Dressed Women.

Washing the Face.

The method of washing the face daily is of great importance, as even if one only washes it twice a day the operation has to be gone through 700 times in the course of a year, and this would naturally affect it for good or evil. Highly scented or highly colored soaps should be avoided, and one which gives a soft lather and does not cause any feeling of irritation is the best. The soap should be well rubbed into the face with a clean piece of flannel and then bathed off in a basinful of absolutely clean water, so that every particle of soap may be removed. After thoroughly bathing the face should be dried with a Turkish towel, and then, if the skin be coarse and thick, it may be rubbed with a rough towel, but if the skin is at all sensitive a very soft towel should be used and the face finally well rubbed over with a piece of chamois leather, or, better still, with the finger tips when clean, tends to remove lines and to prevent the formation of wrinkles. If lines have formed, the skin should be rubbed in a direction contrary to their length, as, for example, if there are vertical lines between the two eyebrows they should be rubbed from side to side. If there are straight lines across the forehead, they should be rubbed down from the hair to the root of the nose and back again.—Exchange.

Bottle Raised Babies Have Poor Teeth.

"Bottle raised babies may be just as good as babies raised in the natural way," said a well known dentist to a Star reporter, "but there is no doubt that they are deficient in the stability of their teeth. I don't know that the bottle foods injure their teeth or prevent the teeth from becoming as hard as the teeth of more fortunate babies. The trouble appears to be in the nursing from the rubber nipple. The sulphur or other material used in hardening the rubber injures the teeth in other ways than by discoloring them. It softens them so that they decay and fall out at least a year or year and a half earlier than they should. I know it is useless to decry raising babies by bottle, for there are those who pay no attention to such complaints. The dentist, however, has no difficulty in distinguishing bottle raised babies by the appearance and condition of their teeth. There should be some substitute for the rubber nipple, and it seems strange with all the improvements of modern times that the rubber nipples of our great-grandmothers' days are still in use."—Washington Star.

Cleaning Oil Paintings.

A good way to clean oil paintings and gilt frames is the following: The picture should be taken from the frame, laid flat and covered with a cloth moistened with rainwater. This process should be repeated until all dirt on the picture has been absorbed by the cloth, or is so saturated with moisture that it will be an easy matter to take it off with the cloth. After this the picture should be gone over gently with a bit of cotton saturated with pure linseed oil. The paint will then look like new. It should never be washed or scrubbed, and soap will spoil any picture. A drop or two of spirits of ammonia in the water with which the cloth is moistened will not hurt. Gilt frames are best restored to their original brilliancy by rubbing with half a fresh, juicy onion. An hour or two after the application of the onion the frame should be sponged with a little tepid rainwater, and it should be immediately dried without rubbing it by pressing soft linen upon the frame until all the moisture has disappeared.
