IN MEMORIAM CHARLES BRIGHT CLAY

When Charles Bright Clay of Bridgetown died on August 18th, Prince Edward Island was called to mourn the loss of a man who occupied a high place for many years in the Agricultural, and also the political life of this Island. The late Mr. Clay was a son of Charles Clay, a native of Devonshire, England, who settled at Dundas with his father, Dr. Thomas Charles Clay who had been a surgeon in the British Army during the Napoleonic wars and who had been granted an area of 400 acres of land near the present Dundas Centre, by the British Government when he retired from the British Army. Dr. Clay practiced his profession at Montague for several years before he settled on his land at Dundas.

Charles Bright Clay's mother was Elizabeth Taylor, daughter of Jacob Taylor who settled on a portion of land granted at what is now Annandale for a Loyalist settlement. Mr. Clay was born at Bridgetown on March 2nd, 1868 and had reached the age of 87 years at his death. He was twice married, his first wife being Laura Keenan who bore him two sons, the eldest Harold who is well-known throughout Eastern Canada for his great work in promoting the improvement of livestock, also Robin who has the home-stead farm which he cultivates successfully. Mr. Clay's second wife, who survives him was the former Mrs. Pearl Howlett MacDonal. Not many men have had for so many years such a leading place in the farming industry of Prince Edward Island as Mr. Clay had. He was also one of the more prominent liberals of P.E. Island and was a liberal candidate in the Canadian District in the general election of 1908. He refused liberal nomination for that district several times afterward. He was president of the liberal association for Kings

Vessels Still Loading Produce At Montague

Although an early winter seems to be at hand, several vessels are still calling at Montague port for produce for export. This week three vessels made port at Montague, the Loan Ella Mae and the Golden Glow, which arrived here the earlier part of the week and left yesterday with a load of produce for Buren, Newfoundland, and the Pauline Winters, which arrived here yesterday from Grand Banks, Newfoundland. Loading operations will be completed today by the exporter, Poole and Thompson of Montague, after which the vessel will return to Newfoundland. It was learned yesterday that the buoys marking the Montague River were taken up Thursday so that the channel is in large measure unmarked except for poles where the buoys were located, nor is it possible to estimate how long these will remain since with the first skim ice they will probably go out with it. It is possible that the shipping season for Montague is at an end for this year, but on the whole the number of ships coming to port here compares favorably with last year, and may perhaps improve next year with more calls being made, not only for potatoes, but also for the moving of pulpwood of which a great deal more is being stored in

New Water Supply For Fire Fighting At Montague

The residents of the extreme north section of the town of Montague are breathing easier today as one of the greatest fire fighting hazards, no water, has been overcome with the completion of the dam at the Burnt Bridge. For years the residents at this end of the town have lived on hope that no serious fire would occur, and they have been fortunate in that only a few small ones took place which were quickly extinguished. Today, although they do not intend to relax their vigilance, they are assured on an ample supply of water should such a major fire occur. The Town Council has been working on this idea for some time, but a means had to be devised which would be satisfactory to all, particularly to the Government Department of Highways, since the water from this stream flows under the main road. The solution involved a dam with a by-pass, which provides a body of water almost 150 feet long, 40 feet wide, and a head of water of 3 feet. This should take care of any eventualities, and the Town Council is to be commended for its foresight in providing a water supply in an area that greatly required it.
