Evangelistic Services Held In Central Christian Church

Evangelist Dr. Charles P. Herndon, minister of Central Christian Church since July 5, spoke on the subject, "Christ—Head of the Church", at revival services last night. The evangelistic meeting is slated to continue through Sunday, Sept. 13.

Dr. Herndon employed Colossians 1:18 as his text for the sermon and pointed out that headship is recognized on universal, governmental, domestic and ecclesiastical levels. Some considerations relating to Christ's headship in His church are, according to the minister, His identity, the fact that He built the church, the fact that He is the cementing influence, life-giving power and the Shepherd and Bishop of the church.

In line with Christ's identity, Dr. Herndon showed that the Saviour is the long-awaited Messiah, the Son of the living God, the image, exact expression and form of the Father, the Word of God in flesh. The speaker cited these words of Jesus: "... He that hath seen me hath seen the Father..." (John 14:9).

In discussing membership in

Christ's body, the church, the evangelist showed that such membership is an individual and not a denominational matter. He said in part: "While every true Christian throughout the world is a part of that body (i.e., the church of Christ on earth), all the several hundreds of religious denominations cannot, per se, claim to be parts of Christ's body."

Car Radio Theft Charge Is Heard

The last two witnesses for the prosecution were heard Friday afternoon in the case of Arthur Kimball Lafferty, Charlottetown, charged before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C., in Queens County Magistrate's Court, with the theft of a car radio.

Walter Bowlan, radio and TV repairman of Charlottetown, gave testimony as to the value and condition of the radio, produced in court. He stated that it was probably worth \$50 to \$55.

Under cross-examination by defence counsel Lester O'Donnell, the witness said an offer of \$45 could be considered as a fair price for the radio.

The final witness Raymond Wakelin of Winsloe, from whose car the radio was stolen, testified that on the night the radio was taken he along with his brother and two friends were en route to Charlottetown from Cornwall.

Just after taking the turn in the vicinity of the White Spot restaurant, witness said one of the rear wheels came off the

car. Shortly after driving the car over to the side of the highway clear of traffic, Wakelin stated that the accused came along and gave all four a lift into the city.

Before leaving his own car the witness said that he picked up the wheel and locked it in the trunk of his car and also locked all doors.

In reply to a question Wakelin said that at no time did he give the accused permission to return to the abandoned vehicle.

Shown the radio the witness identified it as the one that was in his car and which had later been removed without his knowledge. He said that he had no idea of how entry into the locked vehicle was made.

Cross-examined he was positive that all car doors were locked and that he had retained the key on his person.

At this point John P. Nicholson indicated that the crown's case was complete, whereupon defence counsel requested a remand until Monday, Sept. 14th, which was granted by the magistrate.

12 Traffic Violators Fined By Queens Co. Magistrate

Twelve persons were arraigned under various sections of the Highway Traffic Act, before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C., in Queens County Magistrate's Court, yesterday afternoon.

Residents of Wood Islands, Charlottetown, Souris and Saint John, N.B., were each given fines of \$10 and costs or in default of payment five days in jail, following the conviction on charges of speeding. A fifth person convicted on a similar charge received a fine of \$15 and costs or ten days.

Failure to stop at a "Stop" sign resulted in fines of \$5 and costs or five days being meted out to two residents of Charlotetown and another from Tracadie Cross. A similar penalty was imposed upon a North River man for operating a motor vehicle with defective equipment, (lights, brakes, etc.).

Failure to report an accident to the RCMP cost a Little Sands resident a fine of \$10 and costs or five days. The case of a West Royalty man charged with failure to yield the right-of-way was adjourned until Friday, September 18th, at the request of the

accused to allow him time to line up witnesses for the defence.

Residents of South Rustico and Cornwall convicted under the Temperance Act, with the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their residence, were each given the minimum penalty of \$20 and costs or in default of payment 30 days in Queens County Jail.

Baha'i Leader To Speak Here

Winston G. Evans, of Nashville, Tennessee, a graduate of the University of the South, Sewanee, Tenn., who after the Wall Street market crash in 1929-30 turned his thoughts to spiritual matters, has been a Baha'i for 22 years.

Mr. Evans has given lectures on comparative religions at the Vanderbilt University, Southern Methodist University, and the University of Arkansas, and will be the speaker at the Charlottetown Hotel Monday evening, September 14th.

In 1954 Mr. Evans attended the World Council of Churches meeting in Evanston, Ill. He has had numerous opportunities to discuss the Baha'i Faith with Christian leaders including Dr. Adolf Keller, of Switzerland, E. Stanley Jones, Glenn Clark, Nels F. S. Ferre and Dr. Frank Lauback.

Mr. Evans arrives by plane Monday and will be a guest at the Blair Athol during his brief stay in this city.

First War Sergeant-Major Visits Former P.E.I. Buddies

A one-time sergeant-major with the old 2nd Heavy Battery of the First World War, F. V.M. Hinman, Cobourg, Ont., is spending a vacation at Stanhope while renewing former friendships.

Mr. Hinman has already met many of his wartime buddies and has been receiving a royal welcome from them. Among them was Harry MacDougall, city merchant, who arranged what almost amounted to a muster parade of remaining veterans of the unit.

When the 2nd Heavy Battery was formed in 1914 Mr. Hinman was soon promoted to sergeant and in France in 1916 became a sergeant-major. In his younger days he was nicknamed "Bush" and carried it all through his army service. Today, though he is now retired with the rank of lieutenant-colonel, he is still "Bush" to his friends.

This visit to Prince Edward Island is one he says he has had in his mind since he first got out

of the army in 1919. He agrees that the many boasts about "The Island" made by his buddies were justified and not the least exaggerated. Accompanying him is Mrs. Hinman, also making her first visit to the province.

Foreign Capital Gains Recorded

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada gained \$126,000,000 in foreign capital during the second quarter of the year from the two-way trade in government and corporation securities.

The bureau of statistics, reporting today on the capital inflow during the April-June period, said it was marked by an increase in the sale of new corporate securities in other countries.

But the total capital influx declined from \$158,000,000 in the first quarter of the year due to a sharp rise in the amount of requirements of foreign-held Canadian securities. This increase to \$72,000,000 in the second quarter from \$37,000,000 during January, March, and compared with requirements of only \$140,000,000 in the whole of last year.
