

Local and Other Items.

THE steamship *Prince Edward*, Fraser, commander, arrived from Liverpool this forenoon, with a cargo of general merchandise, to Peake Bros. & Co. She made the passage in 12 days.

MILITIA.—Four artillery guns of this district are to be sent to Kingston Military Academy. They will be replaced by guns of larger calibre. Their passage through the streets to-day excited some curiosity.

TO-day being "The Twelfth," an Orange demonstration and Tea was held at Milton. At ten o'clock, the members of the city Lodge, numbering about two hundred—including a lodge of Young Britons—marched in regalia from the lodge to the Railway Station. The procession headed by Galbraith's Band, passed down Queen and along Water Streets to the Railway Station, escorted by a platoon of twelve Policemen. It was seen an admired by many. There was no excitement. At the Station the procession was joined by many more citizens.

MR. At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, Henry Charlton appeared for being drunk and refusing to leave the Police Station. He was fined \$1 and costs or four days. Francis McAdam, for larceny, was sentenced to six months imprisonment with hard labor. John Coyle appeared on summons for being the owner of a certain premises that was complained of as a nuisance. He was not the occupant of the premises, and as the occupant was not present, the case was postponed till Monday. John Breen, Michael Conway, Peter Woods, Hugh Campbell, and Widow Farady were each fined \$2 and costs or eight days for allowing a nuisance to exist on the premises. George Weldon, for a similar offence, was fined 5 cents and costs. James Hughes, waterman, appeared on complaint of his wife for using abusive and threatening language towards her. The defendant requested that the case be postponed until Monday, that he might bring witness to show that she provoked the threats.

DURING the past year the St. Dunstan's Cathedral has been entered many times and candlesticks, lamps, cloths and various articles taken therefrom. The surroundings of the Cathedral were watched, but no trace of the thief could be found. Yesterday evening two young ladies entered the Cathedral about dusk and found a suspicious looking individual in the sanctuary rolling up one of the white altar cloths. They quickly informed the sexton of the matter. He went immediately into the church and found a man named Francis McAdam in the sacristy. On the entrance of the sexton McAdam asked for Father Bodreault. The sexton told him the reverend gentleman was in the Palace, and he left the sacristy to go thither. A gentleman named Timothy Buckley, who accompanied the sexton to the church, suspecting something, followed McAdam to the door. As he passed out a white cloth was seen to slip from under his coat. Seeing this Mr. Buckley immediately detained him in the porch and held him until the arrival of the police. He was tried before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon and was sentenced to six months' imprisonment with hard labor. McAdam has a very bad character and is a man over whom the police always require to keep a strict watch.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

MONTREAL.

All Quiet—No Procession at 2 o'clock.

MONTREAL, July 12. There was no trouble up to one o'clock to-day.

LATER. MONTREAL, July 12—2.30 p. m. Up to the present time the procession has not marched. The members of the Lodges are discussing the propriety of postponing the march until the 16th.

LATEST. MONTREAL, July 12—3 p. m. The Orangemen have decided not to walk in procession to-day. They will walk on Tuesday next—the anniversary of Hackett's funeral.

Slow Improvement of Emperor William.

Massacre of Whites in the South Seas!

(Special Despatch to Examiner.) VIENNA, July 11.

The request of Turkey, that when Austria enters Bosnia, she should declare she respects the Sultan's sovereign right, has been received.—Austria replying that she, acting upon a European mandate, could not discuss a question of principle.

BERLIN, July 11.

Emperor William's physicians have issued another long statement in regard to his condition. They attribute His Majesty's relatively slow progress towards recovery to the great loss of blood; and his appetite, owing to the shock to his system, the mental depression, his attainable degree of strength is not yet regained. His power of locomotion is small, his hands are helpless, and he can only eat with assistance.

MADRID, July 11. The Minister of Finance intends to defer the issue of the Cuban loan of 125,000,000 piastres.

BERLIN, July 11. The session of Congress to-day lasted four hours and fifteen minutes. Lord Beaconsfield was again absent. The reading of the treaty was completed, only a few immaterial points are left for settlement on Saturday. There will be no sitting on Friday in order to allow time for the preparation of the treaty.

LONDON, July 12. A telegram from Sydney, Australia, dated the 11th, states that two tribes of natives have risen against the Government on the island of New Caledonia and massacred 125 whites, including women and children.

CORRECT.—Says the Halifax *Presbyterian Witness*:—"Governor Tilley is to be a candidate for St. John city. His return to public should be cordially welcomed by all who prize high talent and ardent patriotism in a statesman."

POPE LEO XIII. ON ORANGEISM.—In a conversation which the eminent Cardinal Cullen, the Catholic Archbishop of Dublin, reports his eminence had with the present Pope, on matters pertaining to the Catholic Church in Belfast, Ireland, His Holiness said:—"What accounts are there of late of the Orangemen?" Not expecting such a question, I hesitated about answering, and did not know what to say. Seeing my embarrassment, His Holiness came to my relief, and finished the conversation on this matter by saying, 'Let up hope that for the future all parties will give up their feuds, practice mutual forbearance, and live in peace and charity.' The Pope's inquiries about the Orangemen convinced me that he must be well acquainted with all the party disputes that injure Ireland so much."

THERE is yet another serious blunder to record in the legislation of the Davies Cabinet. The Registration of Voters' Act is a confused mass of ill-digested matter. Before Judge Alley's Court here on Monday, it was argued that voters in this city who did not pay their poll tax before the 18th of June, the day on which the sittings of the Court began, are disfranchised, and can no longer be placed on the lists of voters for the ensuing Dominion elections. This is a charming stroke of policy. The Davies faction know the strength of the Conservative vote in Charlottetown, and the law has been so curiously worded that many Conservatives are struck off. Should Judge Alley confirm the objection raised in his court it will be for the Government to call an immediate session of the House in order to rectify their defective legislation—that is to say, if our ministers want to escape the imputation of having purposely contrived this disgraceful trap to catch their opponents.—*Herald*.
