UNITED STATES.

DESTRUCTION OF THE NEW YORK QUARANTINE BUILDINGS BY AN INCENDIARY.

On Wednesday night last, an armed mob attacked the Quarantine station on Staten Island, and set fire to the buildings occupied by the sick, destroying the whole of them.

We copy the following particulars from the Boston Courier of last Saturday, which says, that since the massacre at Cawpoore we have had no such specimen of "man's inhumanity to man" as this—

At the first attack of the mob, Dr. Bissell summoned the stevedores and others employed at Quarantine, to make a resistance, but they were soon overpowered, one of their number, a Swede, named Hegeman, being shot in the back and severely wounded.

The incendiaries include some of the most prominent men of Stapleton, among them a Justice of the Peace, who glories in the part he took.

A meeting of citizens of Richmond county was held at Tompkinsville on Thursday evening, for the purpose of making arrangements to celebrate the burning of the Quarantine buildings, and a committee was appointed for that object.

HAYTI INVITING THE FREE NEGROES OF THE UNITED STATES.

The fact may not be generally known that two agents or commissioners of the Emperor of Hayti are now travelling through this country for the purpose of learning the sentiments of the free negro population in reference to emigration to that Island.

REMARKABLE FALLING OFF IN THE SHIPMENT OF BREADSTUFFS.

The New York Herald says, yesterday there was not a bushel of grain or a barrel of flour on board a vessel up for Glasgow or Liverpool, and that on vessels for London there were only 1200 barrels of flour on board, and not a bushel of grain; while the principal measurer was not measuring a bushel of grain for export.

The continued accounts from Europe, of favorable harvests and declining grain markets has caused a reaction in the price of breadstuffs all over the United States and Canada, and the market has a downward tendency.

P. S.—A despatch from New Orleans dated Aug. 31, evening, says that for the previous twenty-four hours only six deaths of the fever had occurred at the Charity Hospital, which is a great decrease.

TARIFF OF THE ATLANTIC CABLE.—The New York Journal of Commerce says:—
