That Body Of Yours

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coveries may extend this by many years.

For years most of us have looked on aging as a terminal process, as a running down or wearing out of the organism, as a final tissue and organ deterioration preceding death. Dr. Boas states that this is not correct, that aging is but a part of the whole cycle of life. "Growth, differentiation, involution are but different phases of the life curve, manifesting themselves at different rates in different structures of the body. Changes occur during earlier life, and, as a matter of fact, life processes and organ alterations proceed at a far more rapid pace in the young than in the old. After fifty, changes in the life curve are at their slowest."

The time curve of aging depends upon three factors: heredity, external environment and the internal environment of the body. The most important of these is heredity. Longevity is a family characteristic.

The human changes occurring with aging are: loss in height, loss in weight, failing eyesight, deafness for high tones, graying of the hair, loss of elasticity of the skin. None of these alterations of the structure and texture of the body are regarded as disease processes; none of them challenges or shortens the life span.

The most common diseases that bring on aging and death in persons over 65 years of age are: hardening of the blood vessels of the heart, brain and other parts of the body, high blood pressure, cancer of stomach and intestine, enlargement of the prostate gland in men, tuberculosis and street accidents.
