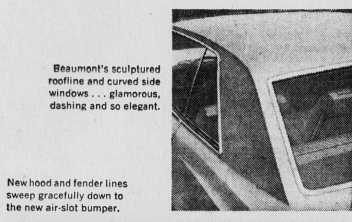
## John Keane Has No Idea

NEW YORK (AP) — Johnny Keane said Wednesday he has no idea whether he will be asked to return as manager of St. Louis Cardinals next year. The little skipper, who has kept the Cardinals in the National League pennant race, said he did not expect to learn his status until the end of the season. "The club has been on the road for a long spell and I've had very little communication with the front office," he said.

"I did receive a telephone call from Bob Howsam, our general manager, some time ago. He then said he would prefer to wait until after the season before discussing 1965. If that met with my approval, I said it was all right with me. That's the way it stands right now." Keane, of course, is fully aware of rumors of his pending dismissal with either Leo Dolner, coach of Los Angeles Dodgers, or Charlie Metro succeeding him. Metro has won two pennants at Denver under Howsam. He later was head coach of Chicago Cubs before joining the White Sox as a scout.

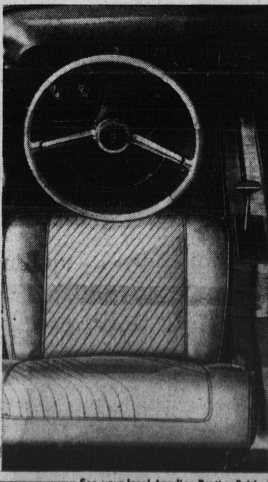

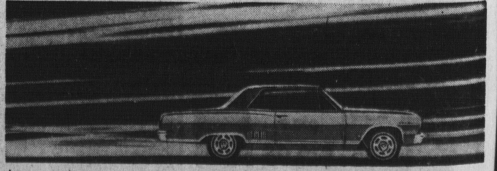
