months will bring," he said, "but of one thing we can be certain, a continuance of the spirit of responsibility and co-operation on the part of the two great partners in production (labor and management) will be essential if we are to maintain our high living standards and at the same time increase our military strength.

Other Messages

Labor Day messages also were issued by Percy R. Bengough, president of the 502,000-member T. L. C., and A. R. Mosher, president of the Canadian Congress of Labor, which has 350,000 members.

President Mosher made an appeal to bring help to underprivileged countries as a means of averting war.

"While we must be ready to defend ourselves as a nation and to associate with other nations for this purpose," he said, "defence is primarily a negative tactic. It (the Congress) has therefore strongly endorsed Canadian participation in the activities of the United Nations and in other international bodies.

"It recognizes that defence preparations have a certain deterrent effect, but it is convinced that Canada and the other nations which are comparatively well-to-do ought to give a great deal more attention to efforts to improve conditions in the under-privileged nations of the world."

"If war is to be avoided or averted," he added, "the most effective action directed towards this end is to raise the standard of living for the hundreds of millions of dispossessed peoples in backward nations. They must be given food and tools and, most of all, hope for the future."

country is called to make to the welfare of the world. With all our defects there is a new sense of responsibility for conditions in less favored lands, but it is still weak in comparison with what it ought to be.

The same choice is before people of all occupations. Each profession has its "etiquette" which really means its rules of conduct. To be true to them it will often mean that the young practitioner, striving for a footing, will have to turn down offers of money which he needs sorely, and his future depends on his choice. Will the author persist in his ideal, or will he lower it for the sake of gain? This is no imaginary issue; Wordsworth and Browning bore loss for years until their ideals were accepted by the people. Will the preacher obey the command to Jeremiah to speak to all the people all the words which God commands him to speak; to diminish not a word? Or will he dilute his message? So on it goes—will the workman in any field keep first the interests of those whom he serves as "the Master of all
