Cape Town despatches say the Tamboekis have allied themselves with the Basutos against the British.

It is probable that the proposed revision of the Swiss constitution will be rejected by a large majority.

Sir Henry Haveleck has received £500,000 from a cousin on condition of the former taking the name of 'Allan.'

A Hungarian officer has succeeded in swimming across the Platten Sea, a distance of twenty English miles. The time was seventeen hours.

The Afghan losses in the last encounter with the British must have been enormous, as it took them eight days to bury the dead after the battle.

Theodore Tilton's oldest daughter Florence, whose name was often mentioned a while ago in connection with the troubles of her family, has just been married in London to a New Orleans physician of note—a Dr. Pelton.

It is proposed to give a public dinner at Ottawa to Mr. Frechette on his arrival home, from having been the first Canadian literary man who has been the recipient of distinguished honors abroad. A committee is now being formed for the purpose.

Jesse Grant, third son of Gen. U. S. Grant, ex President of the United States, was married at the Palace Hotel, San Francisco, on Tuesday evening, to Lizzie, daughter of W. W. S. Chapman, of that city. Mr. Jesse Grant is 22 years of age and in business as a stockbroker in New York.

During the week a steamer left Liverpool for New Orleans with one hundred and fifty British farmers booked for Texas. It is strange that such people can be beguiled into fixing on a country like Texas as their future home, so utterly unsuited to them in every way. They have, we suppose, credulous tendencies which have been taken advantage of by unscrupulous agents, who stick at nothing to secure their object.

The punishment of crucifixion, observed the Fochow Herald, is by no means uncommon in China, although it is not, strictly speaking, legal. Pirates are occasionally nailed by the hands and feet to an X shaped cross. We met a man the other day who had seen it himself. The pirate screamed at first and fainted, but as soon as he recovered he spat at the magistrate and abused him roundly. The wretched man was suffered to linger in the broiling sun for three days.

One New York tenement house just been made infamous by the occurrence within its walls of sixteen deaths from diphtheria. Of course, after so much slaughter there was the usual official enquiry, resulting in the discovery that the building was in a most unwholesome condition—tide water in the cellar, and filth in abundance—all the modern conveniences for generating dirt diseases. It was ordered to be vacated in five days. It is another case of late locking. Had it been emptied a few months ago, considerable less grave digging would have been done.

The St. John Telegraph of the 23rd instant, referring to the working of the Canada Temperance Act, 1878, says:—"John Alberton of Woodstock, was summoned to appear last Saturday, and confessed and paid over \$50. Mrs. Stephenson was summoned for Monday, and appeared before Sitting Magistrate Skillen. Some three of our well-known citizens were subpoenaed to prove the sale of the liquor, but to them the question of proving against a "widow" was more than their feelings would bear, and they absolutely refused. In due order of things, they were committed to jail for contempt of court, where they are incarcerated.
