Development Of Nursing Profession In P. E. Island

The Registered Nurses' Association of Prince Edward Island was organized twenty eight years ago and functioned as such until January of this year. An Act to license nurses in Prince Edward Island, having been passed the previous year, came into effect January 1, 1950, and the organization is now known as The Association of Nurses of Prince Edward Island. This is the second Provincial Nurses' Association in Canada to license nurses and we look with satisfaction on such an achievement.

Twenty years ago the membership of the Association had 64 active members; ten years later it had increased to 75 and today the active membership is 309, non-practising membership 137 and non-resident membership 97.

In November 1946 the Association of Nurses was fortunate in procuring the services of Miss Madeleine M. Baker who was appointed Secretary-Registrar and organized a Provincial office in preparation for the administration of the Licensing Act in Prince Edward Island. A Community Nursing Registry was also set up in the office of the Association.

Miss Baker was on loan from Ontario and could stay only a limited period of time. Miss Muriel Archibald was appointed as Secretary-Registrar and Nursing School Advisor and Nursing Schools of Nursing and Hospitals throughout the Island with the aim of increasing the supply and promoting nursing education.

Miss Archibald has a host of friends who welcome her back and who wish her every success.

Canada Nears Trade Balance With The U. S.

OTTAWA, Oct. 24 — (CP) — A historic trade record appears to be in the making as preliminary figures from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics showed Canada boosted exports to the United States in September and neared a trade balance with her southern neighbor.

Exports to the U.S. in September totalled \$195,900,000, a gain of \$80,500,000 over shipments of \$115,400,000 in the same period a year ago. Imports from the U.S. at \$176,400,000 reflected a gain of \$21,400,000 over last year's \$158,000,000.

The balance of exports over imports totalled \$18,500,000, cutting the traditional deficit with the U.S. for nine months to \$75,500,000, compared with a deficit last year of about \$431,000,000.

A sharp downward movement developed in sales to the United Kingdom. September exports to the U.K. totalled \$30,500,000, down from last year's \$57,400,000. Imports from the U.K. increased to \$36,400,000 from \$21,900,000.

Shipments to all countries in September totalled \$282,700,000 and imports were estimated at \$289,400,000.

TRIESTE, Oct. 24 — (Reuters) — About 1,700 British troops landed on the coast near Trieste just before dawn today in the biggest joint Anglo-American manoeuvres held in the Trieste area since the war.
