## Liquor Sale Case Hears 4 Testify

Four crown witnesses were heard yesterday in the case of Gordon MacLeod, 45 Grafton Street, Charlottetown, charged before Magistrate A.J. Haslam in court police order under the Liquor Act, with selling liquor to another person.

## New Air Service to Operate Here

A new air service that will operate from the Charlottetown Airport has been granted a license by the Air Transport Board.

Inland Flying Services Limited will operate a non-scheduled, passenger and freight charter service.

Harold Kemp, Charlottetown, who is doing some of the commercial flying for the company this summer, said yesterday that the service has three sub-machine guns, ten hand-drawn machine guns, and a truck that will be used to transport the aircraft at present - a two-seat Cessna 175 and a four-seat Piper Tri-Pacer.

The four-seat aircraft will be used for charter work. The Air Transport Board license allows the company to do a variety of work, such as aerial photography, timber cruising and even wildlife counts.

Mr. Kemp said that the company plans to use various aircraft in the province which, he said, some interested persons are considering constructing. He added that the air strip at the old Mt. Pleasant Airport may also be used.

It is also hoped by the company that a school on flying instruction will be set up.

**HIGH FALLOUT DETECTED**

The record of 14 and damage of "the year under a summer" is cooling the Atlantic area on Monday, according to a Canadian Press report yesterday, but Prince Edward Island seems to have fared better than her sister seaside provinces, at least in the tourist industry.

George Fraser, director of the P.E.I. Travel Bureau, said yesterday that the poor weather has not affected tourist revenue. "Although visitors may stay as long as usual, the greater turnover in numbers compensates for the loss," he said.

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There has been an increase in tourists bringing trailers or tents, and these find suitable sites at the various trailer parks and camping areas. Campers in the National Park areas were close to 3,000 over the average for July of 1961.

Others and visitors at Green Gables also showed a normal yearly increase.

**FEW VACANCIES**  
Accommodations at the north shore have been more or less filled, with vacancies varying from day to day. Before 1961, the number of cottages and hotels were very numerous, but the Travel Bureau is not having any trouble placing people.

Hotels and cottages in the Charlottetown area are busy but due to the large number of tourists in the city there is not much difficulty in placing people.

Reports from Summerside indicate that despite the fact there are more individual units for the accommodation of tourists in that town this year, the "no vacancy" sign has been a quiet hand during August as well as throughout the season.
