# Tugs Towing Lighthouse To River Berth

Canadian Press Staff Writer LEVIE, Que. (CP)—A giant floating lighthouse that looks like an oversized yo-yo began a 100-mile trip down the St. Lawrence river Thursday after almost a year's delay.

The bulky steel-and-concrete structure is destined for use near the mouth of the Saguenay river in the St. Lawrence, where treacherous reefs and shoals pose a constant threat to river traffic.

First attempts last August to install the 4,500-ton lighthouse on a prepared bed of gravel and rock were foiled by unfavorable tides and high winds.

peaches, melons and finished anti-freeze.

More significant, perhaps, was the CANADIAN decision to increase its anti-dumping powers to fight subsidized imports.

Canada has been concerned with increasing use by other countries of subsidies to domestic industries, allowing them to sell their products at a price lower than in countries where industries receive no special support.

**EXAMPLES NOT GIVEN**

Officials would give no examples for fear it might cause Canada diplomatic embarrassment. But they said that even the U.S. is increasing its use of price support and subsidies in efforts to capture a greater share of world markets in agricultural products. They said the idea of price support or subsidy also is inherent in state factories in Communist countries.

"Such subsidized goods, if imported into Canada, might cause or threaten material injury to established Canadian producers," Mr. Harris said.

Under current laws if a product enters Canada to compete with Canadian production and bears a price lower than that prevailing in its home market, the government can jack up the price to what it may consider a fair one and charge the difference to the importer as a dumping duty. But the laws did not cover state subsidies.

The amendment will give the government authority "to levy an additional duty equal to the estimated amount of subsidy."
