The case was adjourned to Thursday, November 24, and bail set at \$3,000 in two sureties of \$2,500 each. Accused was remanded in custody until the bail is raised. He is not yet represented by counsel.

The main issue at the special session of the Prince Edward Island Legislature which opens in Charlottetown this afternoon will be authorization of funds required for free school textbooks, supplementary allowances for old age pensioners, and additional money required in highway construction.

Legislation will be offered creating the separate portfolio of labor and authorizing the appointment of a minister without portfolio.

There will be an amendment to the provincial income tax act to establish the rate of taxation for 1967. This rate is established every five years.

CREDIT UNION LEADERS MEET

Credit Union leaders assembled at the Charlottetown Hotel on Tuesday evening to discuss the role of Cuna National Society, the insurance company of credit unions in providing service to credit union members on P.E.I. Among those present were (FROM LEFT) Reg Harvey, Cuna Mutual Representative for N.B. - P.E.I.; Elmer Hynes, field representative for credit unions in N.B. - P.E.I. and the Gaspé Peninsula of Quebec; Ben Gallant, credit union Islander of the Year; and Frank DesRoches, Chapter P.O.R., for Charlottetown area. Mr. Hynes, agricultural economist gave the key-note address.

Psychological Story Is Doctor's Topic

"A Psychological Detective Story", was the topic chosen by Dr. J.D. Griffin, general director of the Canadian Mental Health Association, to address the dinner meeting of the P.E.I. Branch of the Canadian Club, held last night at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Dr. Griffin opened his remarks by tracing some of the drama related to the understanding of mental illness in Canada. "We are on the verge of some spectacular and important discoveries in this field," he stated.

The speaker pointed out that "almost 50 years ago in Toronto, a young physician, Dr. Clarence M. Hincks, working under the general supervision of Dr. C.K. Clarke, started a special out-patient clinic for mentally disordered, at the newly opened Toronto General Hospital. This was the first psychiatric clinic to open in Canada."

Dr. Griffin went on to say that this clinic attracted a large number of people and as a result became very crowded, with a long waiting list. "After a great deal of study the result was, the organization in 1918 of the Canadian National Committee for Mental Hygiene (now the Canadian Mental Health Association)."

"Dr. C.K. Clarke, the first medical director of the new organization, led the first attack. He proposed that the only controllable source of mental disorder was the inflow of people from other countries. During the World War I, there were thousands of immigrants coming to Canada, many of them mentally retarded and psychotic. The new organization pressed for a stricter medical screening of immigrants."

Psychiatric methods were added to the routine physical examinations given to all new Canadians. As a result the flooding into Canada of mental misfits was stopped," Dr. Griffin stated.

He pointed out that the idea—a good one at the time—has backfired. With the psychiatric regulations now firmly written into the immigration legislation, we are finding that many desirable immigrants are being excluded simply because they have at one time served a term of treatment in a mental hospital. Many of them now have good mental health and a favourable prognosis. We have spent the last 10 years trying to convince the Federal Government to change this act," he added.

The speaker said that "Dr. Hincks postulated that childhood was the golden opportunity for developing a preventive program." Let us learn how the normal, healthy child develops," he stated "let us educate the parents in the proper rearing and management of children and we will prevent mental illness at its source—primary prevention."

The speaker pointed out that positive proof of prevention seemed difficult to obtain. The more knowledge of children that was gained the more complex became the problem of the cause of breakdown.

The next step was the development of child psychiatric clinics. It was thought that the early treatment of these disorders would prevent serious breakdowns.

"Mental illness has complex, multiple causes. No one measure could even present their onset. This fact persisted until very recently when public interest and concern was sparked by new methods of treatment, and encouraged by a new look at the problem."

The emphasis on treatment in the community, in general hospitals and close to wherever people lived, resulted in the fact that the hospitals began to show a small but significant decrease in the number of resident patients. This meant at the same time that thousands of people who would formerly have been mental hospital patients, are now living in the community, maintained on the new drugs in an uncertain balance."

Dr. Griffin pointed out that "Throughout Canada we are at last planning the important after care and rehabilitation services, which we must have to maintain these people in a reasonable, productive and happy state."
