

Current Notes.

An international electric exhibition is being held at Munich.

Balthazar Grun, a German socialist leader, has committed suicide in his prison at Berlin.

Bolivia adheres to her alliance with Peru, and will assist the latter in the renewed campaign against Chili.

Mr. Blake's London organ is rehabilitating Sir Richard Cartwright. This is not to be wondered at. Not long ago Judas Iscariot found an apologist.

An ex-member of Parliament, at Victoria, B. C., strenuously objects to the Chinese participating in the reception to the Marquis of Lorne and Princess Louise.

The leading shorthorn breeder of the United States, Mr. Anderson, of Louisville, has announced his intention of substituting Chinamen for negroes on his ranch, and it is believed other breeders will follow his example.

A very clever swindle is reported as having been perpetrated on the Maverick National Bank, of Boston. A respectable looking man gained the confidence of the bank officials by a deposit of \$2,000, and finally succeeded in getting away with \$5,800.

A most brutal murder was committed at the village of Vail's Gate, near Newburg. The victim is a Brooklyn man named Felix McCarthy. The murder seems to have been accompanied by acts of very exceptional brutality. Two men, named Karison and Meeker, have been arrested.

Madagascar is in trouble. Queen Emma prohibited the export of ebony, rosewood, and other valuable products to the United States. Some of her chiefs refused to obey, and the Queen sent a large force to compel obedience. Several skirmishes have taken place. Emma's troops are dying by hundreds of fever.

The Manitoba Exhibition at Kingston is said to be very fine, and, of course, will attract the greatest attention. Among the products are oats averaging five and a half feet in height, a cabbage weighing 27 pounds, a citron of 15 pounds, cauliflower 14 pounds, and potatoes, beets, turnips, etc., in proportion. Ottawa has sent up a delegation to endeavor to secure the Dominion Exhibition next year.

The fact that hostilities have again broken out between the Chilians and Peruvians makes it almost vain to expect any reconciliation unless some power stronger than either bring pressure to bear on them in the interests of civilization and peace. The effects of so prolonged a struggle on trade and industry must be most damaging, and, according to the system of warfare which prevails, the contest may go on for years without coming any nearer to a termination.

The Republican victory in Maine was an important one. It was held to be a doubtful State. The Democrats and Greenbackers had enacted an alliance so thorough and comprehensive that the scattering vote was scarcely more than one per cent. of the total vote cast. Plaisied, the Fusion candidate for re-election, was confessedly the strongest man in the State outside of the Republican party. The Republican nominee for Governor received a clear majority of over seven thousand votes. A solid Republican delegation was elected for Congress, which is a gain of a seat for the party in the next House.

Gallant rides are evidently the fashion, not only with military officers, but with those nondescripts, the war correspondents, who share all the trials and dangers of a campaign, and are yet to be classed as non-combatants. Archibald Forbes will have to look to his laurels. His most dashing exploits are nearly rivalled by the adventurous journey made by Mr. J. C. Cameron, the correspondent of the Standard, who rode through the desert from Kassassin to Ismailia, alone in the middle of the night, with the news of our success. He had already been in the saddle all day, and had accompanied the cavalry in their long flank march and final charge; but he saw his duty, and did it like a man. The consequence was that the paper he so pluckily serves was the only one which had a good account of the Kassassin fight.
