Dear Mary Haworth: My husband is overseas with the Army. He is a wonderful person, though quick to anger with a violent temper, especially when he used to drink occasionally. My mother was dominating strict and over-protective.

Since he is older he doesn't drink at all and has become very religious and a true-blue husband.

In 1941 I had a nervous breakdown and was ill for about a year, which was hard on the children. I finally got all right by taking vitamins and building up my health again.

We have three children: a son nearly 16 and two daughters, ages 15 and 11. The latter adopted by him when she was a baby. Our son is the serious problem at present. 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Household Hints Cotton in the fingertips of rubber gloves will prevent holes and tears from fingernails.
