FIRE AT KINGSTON.—Further particulars of the fire at Kingston, Oct 3, come today. The fire started about 2 o'clock on Friday morning in the saw and grit mill owned by Mr. John Scott, and leaved to Mr. Walter Warren, from it is supposed, the furnace. The alarm was given by Mr. McDougall, and a large crowd of neighbors gathered, but the fire had made considerable progress and they could do nothing but protect the house of McDougall from the flames. The village hall owned by the members of King William Lodge was also burned to the ground. In the mill was a large quantity of grain belonging to different parties, which was also destroyed. Mr. Scott's loss is estimated at about \$2000 and the hall was valued at about \$500, with no insurance in either. The mills were built only a few years ago. Much sympathy is felt for Mr. Scott and the lessee, Mr. Warren.

OUR EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM.

I am surprised that you are desirous of giving up our grand system which we fought so hard to gain and which costs us so much to support. You would go back to the three R's would you? Do you not know, Mr. Editor, that as the poet says "A little learning is a dangerous thing; drink deep or taste not." Why should a man remain in ignorance of the higher branches of education because he is poor? The trouble is that we are not educated half enough and if I had my way I would vastly extend the present facilities. The only point in your article I agree with is that which suggests that the Prince of Wales College should confer degrees. This can be done without reducing the rest of the system. Why should we be the only province in Eastern Canada which has no degree-conferring university? Why should our children have to be sent elsewhere to complete their education? Are we behind the other provinces in intelligence? By no means. Then let us have our own university. As for the expense, that will be comparatively small. We have the professors at present, and a little tax on real property would raise enough to support the institution in good style. There is plenty of money in the country and plenty of brains. Let the former be used to help the latter.

SOURIS BREAKWATER.

Sir,—Having recently paid a visit to Souris it appears to me imperative that some notice should be directed to the breakwater at that place. My first thought was one of amazement. Why, I asked, should Souris be selected for such an expensive undertaking and is there any adequate return made to the Dominion treasury by the people of Souris for such a boon? Manifestly the town is not in a position to maintain a costly artificial harbour out of the revenue derived from so small a population. Why then should the taxes of the people support something for the benefit of Souris? Like many another my narrow selfish every-man-for-himself ideas were aroused at seeing many of the men. I interviewed them after the approved American fashion. "Where does your boat belong?" "Lafayette." "And yours?" "Lunenburg." To my astonishment, I found that out of the large fleet of boats, hardly one really belonged to Souris. Surely, Sir, here is something to be thankful for. We have a Government whose sole consideration is not to secure a surplus. Economy should always be aimed at, but never at the expense of the lives of our brave fishermen. Look at the map and you will perceive at once that Souris harbor is the only haven of refuge for many miles along our coast. Hence the absolute necessity of keeping this breakwater in a sound condition. For the sake of our toilers on the sea, our members at Ottawa must not allow this work to be forgotten. Human lives are more precious than dollars, and the safety of our sailors infinitely transcends the paltry level of party politics. I am informed that the breakwater requires further attention in order to make it thoroughly secure. When a vote of money is proposed for this purpose by the member representing Souris, the member for Lunenburg County ought to remember that his constituents largely benefit from this work, and bearing in mind the humane object of the enterprise support it to the utmost of his ability. There is no doubt but that the fishermen at the next election will show their appreciation of the party whose tender regard for their welfare has been amply demonstrated.
