Campsite Changing Whole Surrounding Area In N.B.

CAMP GAGETOWN, N.B. (CP) — The Canadian army within two years has turned farming valleys of central New Brunswick into a trodden-down training camp area. Within the 427 square miles of Camp Gagetown, biggest military training base in Canada, farm tractors have been replaced by Sherman tanks. Barns shelter Bren-gun carriers instead of hay wagons, and soldiers on sentry duty stand with poised rifles by farmyard gates.

On the hundreds of miles of twisting roads all conventional signs have been pulled up and replaced by the maple leaf military slogans. Military police patrol the highways which carry streams of convoys. **BIG TRANSFORMATION** On hills and mountains troops are tearing down forest and building up mock battlefields. Roads have been hacked through wilderness and a maze of communication lines strung through trees. By old scenic covered bridges, military police hurry along the many vehicles. All this is happening in the hills and river valleys between Fredericton and Saint John, N.B., where the army started forming its big camp in 1953. And with a \$60,000,000 allotment the whole face of the area is being changed.

At Oromocto, where the permanent campsite is springing up in virgin wilderness, about 20 miles of paved streets are being snaked through the recently-flattened forest and dozens of modern concrete buildings are going up. Schools, churches, stores, the stores and modern living quarters are rising with the military buildings at Oromocto, and occupancy will begin before the end of this year.

From a central heating plant that eats 200 tons of coal a day, a seven-foot-deep tunnel burrows 17 miles around the 14,000-acre campsite. This also carries telephone and power lines. **MILITARY TOWN** When completed Oromocto will be a military town of about 12,000 people, including dependents, and they will live in 2,200 married quarters and the centralized barracks blocks. Outside the camp gates the town will be run by an elected mayor and councillors, and commercial businesses will be allowed to open. Private doctors and dentists can set up practices in this area, and a senior officer says "you would be surprised at the number of businessmen who are interested in coming here." Most of the campsite construction, including the ranch-type married quarters, is being done by private contractors.

Traits Seen In Colour Of Eyes

MONTREAL (CP) — Coloration of the eyes is a definite indication of basic personality characteristics, says Dr. Ian Kent, a psychiatrist at McGill University. In a recent issue of the Canadian Psychiatric Journal, Dr. Kent says this finding is the result of 18 years of scientific research for a reliable, easily observable sign that would indicate the basic personality of the individual.

Blue eyes, says Dr. Kent, indicates a person who is a logical thinker and an administrator. He feels physical pain keenly, but has no great need "to be loved." He proceeds slowly, methodically and in a straight line towards a predetermined objective. He wants to dominate and be in charge. The brown-eyed person, on the other hand, says Dr. Kent, is sensitive, creative and self-centred. He needs to be loved and makes decisions through his feelings rather than by logic. He is an artist and an original thinker, but he is not usually a dominant, forceful personality.

COLORING PERMANENT In the middle group, green greyish or brownish eyes, are people with about equally divided characteristics, says Dr. Kent. These people are fortunate because they can understand and get along well with blue and brown-eyed people. They are flexible, adaptable, quick to react, but apt to be irritable and unpredictable in their reactions because they are pulled two ways by different personalities. Pigmentation of the human eye is genetically transmitted and does not change throughout life.

Turbojet Begins Tour Of America

NEW YORK (AP) — Britain's new commercial turbojet aircraft, dubbed the "Whispering Giant," arrived Monday for a North American tour. The four-engine plane is the Bristol Britannia, which achieves its relative noiselessness and 400 mile-an-hour cruising speed by using jet power to operate propellers.

TV Achievement Recalls Work Of Late Col. Rogers

A name memorable in the history of broadcasting in the Maritime Provinces is that of the late Lieut. Colonel Keith S. Rogers, pioneer radio operator and president and managing director of the Island Broadcasting Company, Ltd., until his death in 1954. Colonel Rogers had long been working on plans to bring television here in connection with his radio station CFCY. The success of the company reaching this objective is featured in a special supplement in today's Guardian.



THE LATE COL. ROGERS

Born and educated at Summerside, Col. Rogers built his first wireless set in 1904 and during the winter of 1910-1911 served as wireless operator on the icebreaker C. G. S. Minto. In that latter year he joined the Canadian Signal Corps as a lieutenant and built and operated the first military portable wireless telegraphy set at Petawawa. During the First World War he was stationed at Halifax as Fortress Signals Officer.

In 1920 he built the first radio phone on Prince Edward Island and the following year started broadcasting one hour a day with a power of 10 watts. Col. Rogers was granted the first commercial radio license in Eastern Canada in 1924 with the present call letters of CFCY. On his retirement from the Canadian Militia in 1928 he was promoted to the rank of lieutenant colonel but in 1940 he returned to the service to organize the first Reserve Army unit, No. 6 District Signals, in the Province. He was a past president of the Canadian Association of Broadcasters and past president of the Charlottetown Board of Trade and also took a keen interest in the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, the Canadian Author's Association and the American Academy of Political Science.

Is Critical Of Sentences For Minor Offences

OTTAWA (CP) — Magistrates who sentence youths to one year or 18 months in prison for minor offences are in effect passing life sentences, says a report in the Commons. The CCF member for Cape Breton South said there is a growing tendency among Canadian employers and employment agencies against hiring persons who have served short prison sentences. This practice caused many crime repeaters. Mr. Gillis said a "whol lot of kids" convicted of slight misdemeanors should not be stigmatized for the rest of their lives because their records followed them from job to job. He suggested the justice department establish an agency to educate the public in rehabilitation of former prisoners and that magistrates be cautioned that a one-year sentence can be a "life sentence."

SCHOOLS FOR CRIME Gage W. Montgomery (PC—Victoria-Carleton) said he agrees with Mr. Gillis. He would like to see more done in the field of probation so that imprisonment would be used only as a last resort. In a good many cases, prisons were schools for crime. Mr. Montgomery also maintained that poverty should not be the cause of imprisonment. It was not a right law that a person couldn't pay a fine had to spend so many days in jail. Mr. Montgomery also said a man leaving prison should come out with a clean slate. He should not be met at the gate by a sheriff bearing a warrant for arrest on another charge.

Legal Experts Face Weighty Conferences Within Months

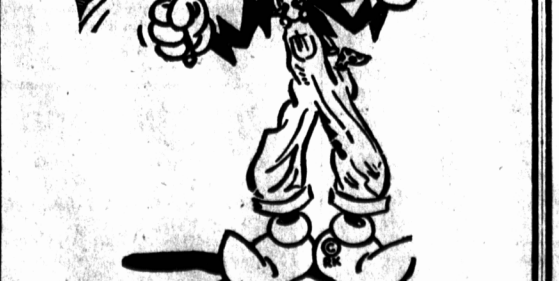
OTTAWA (CP) — Federal and provincial legal experts face a series of weighty conferences starting next fall on proposed changes in the administration of justice in Canada. The federal-provincial talks will be based on four voluminous reports tabled in Parliament in June and July by a joint Senate Commons committee and a special committee appointed by the government. The recommendations in the reports now are being studied by the provinces which are responsible for the administration of justice. Many of them could not be implemented without the approval and co-operation of provincial governments. The initial conference is expected to be attended by Justice Minister Garson and his top officials and by provincial attorneys general. However, the bulk of the work will be conducted by deputy ministers and their officials directly involved in justice administration. First consideration likely will be given to a report by a special four-man committee recommending sweeping changes to the whole field of penal corrections and paroles. **FEDERAL RESPONSIBILITY** The report was prepared by a committee headed by Mr. Justice

Gerald Fauteux of the Supreme Court of Canada. The committee spent more than two years studying the entire Canadian system of remissions. Its two major recommendations call for establishment of a five-member national parole board and for federal responsibility over prisoners sentenced to terms of more than six months, instead of two years as at present. The committee also suggested amendments to the criminal code, as it affects prison terms. The three other reports were tabled by the joint Commons-Senate committee on capital and corporal punishment and lotteries. The committee recommended virtual outlawing of large bingo games and lotteries and prohibition of advertising contests involving chance. It proposed, among other things, a \$5,000 limit on the value of prizes offered in one year by organizations sponsoring bingo games and lotteries. The committee urged retention of the death penalty in Canada but substitution of electrocution or the gas chamber for hanging, and abolition of executions for convicted murderers of 18 years or under. In addition it recommended abolition of the strap only as a "last resort" to maintain order in prisons and jails.

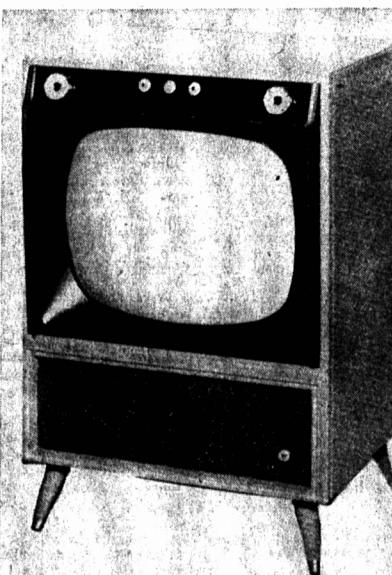

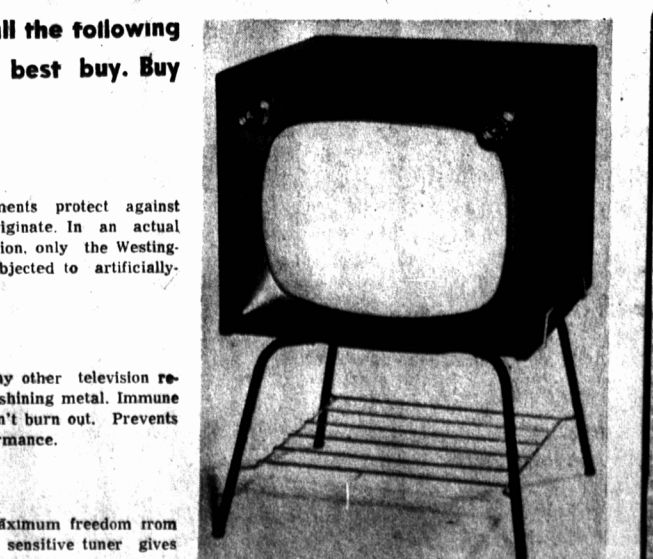
