Delay Legion Move For Unemployment Insurance For All Armed Services

OTTAWA, (CP)—A move by the Canadian Legion to bring all members of the armed forces under unemployment insurance on a contributory basis was set aside Thursday by the Commons committee on veterans affairs.

protection on discharge but their contributions are paid by the government.

Veterans Minister Lapointe said the benefits were begun during the Korean War to protect those leaving the service after a short term. But it was never intended that the regular forces in peacetime should get unemployment on discharge with the government footing the bill.

The amendment to the act also provides that the right of reinstatement in civil service jobs after discharge will not apply to those joining the regular forces after July 1.

T. D. Anderson, legion general secretary, presented the legion brief. He urged unemployment insurance be made available to servicemen on discharge on a contributory basis.

It was noted to protect the serviceman who was discharged for medical or other reasons and who was employable but not in receipt of pension or superannuation. He suggested servicemen and the veterans affairs department contribute equally with the government paying one-fifth of the combined contribution of both.

A. J. Brooks (PC—Royal) and Douglas Harkness (PC—Calgary East) supported the suggestion. Mr. Harkness said 13,000 men were discharged from the forces last year and while it might not be the government's intention to extend unemployment protection in peacetime this was a period of cold war tension in which the serviceman might be called to fight anytime.

Clarie Gillis (CCF—Cape Breton South) said the opinion of servicemen should be obtained before unemployment insurance contributions were forced on them.

Mr. MacDoughall recommended that the legion suggestion be set aside for six months while the services are asked their opinion. The committee agreed.
