OPERATIONS AT THE FRONT

BRITISH SUCCESSFUL AFTER A HARD FIGHT.

Essex Regiment Drives the Boers From Paard's Kraal.

British Killed and Wounded—Carrington's Force Going to Mafeking—The Canadians Engaged—Progress of Dickson's Brigade Stopped.

HARD BUT SUCCESSFUL ACTION.

LONDON, April 24.—The Bloemfontein correspondent of the Standard, describing the operations at Leeuw Kop, says: At an early stage the cavalry came under heavy fire from a pom pom on the range adjoining Leeuw Kop.

Unable to continue its march to the south, General Dickson's brigade fell back to the north to await the infantry attack, the flanking movement having failed. General Pole-Carew, with General Stephenson's brigade, advanced in a crescent form, from the west and south, with the object of enveloping the kopjes.

The Welsh, Warwickshires and Essex, Yorkshire regiments, advanced in extending line covering the West.

The Guards Brigade took up a position to the south with two field batteries and naval guns sheltered by the rocks.

The enemy opened a heavy fire from their rifles and pom pom.

Our men advanced over an open ground in splendid style by a succession of short rushes, falling prone while pouring in their volleys.

The approach of darkness threatened to leave the Boers in possession. But just before sunset the Essex regiment gallantly pressed forward and drove the last of the enemy from Paard's Kraal, a bold spur of Leeuw Kop.

GENERAL WARREN.

DURBAN, April 24.—General Warren has been appointed administrator of Bechuanaland. He sailed yesterday for Cape Town.

LORD ROBERTS' REPORT.

LONDON, April 24.—The War Office later today issued the following from Lord Roberts, dated Bloemfontein, April 23rd, 2.50 p. m.

"Yesterday I despatched the 11th Brigade under General Pole-Carew and two brigades of cavalry under General French from this point to assist General Rundle. The force reached Karrieffontein without much opposition.

"In the Welsh regiment a private was killed, Capt Prothero mortally wounded and seven men wounded.

"Yorkshires, eight wounded. "Eighth Hussars, one killed and one wounded.

"Royal Artillery, two wounded. "Seventh Dragoons, Lieut. Jenkins and ten men missing.

"Capt. Rottos, Royal Artillery, broke an arm by a fall.

"Pole-Carew's mounted infantry seized Leeuw Kop. The enemy evacuated hurriedly, leaving some rifles and ammunition.

"General Rundle reports that 25 men of the First Worcesters are missing. Fifty-three were sent out after dark and only eighteen returned there.

"The numbers and names will be reported today as well as of the four wounded yesterday."

The War Office has given no explanation of the apparent discrepancy in the figures as to the men from the Worcester regiment.

CORRESPONDENTS REPORTS.

LONDON, April 24.—The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail says that General Carrington's force is the only one going to the relief of Mafeking and that no force of any kind is operating from the south of Bloemfontein.

The correspondent of the Telegraph says: The resistance of the Boers at Leeuw Kop was contemptible considering the strength of their position.

They escaped in an easterly direction, the Guards failing to get quite around them.

The Bloemfontein correspondent of the Times says: The British cavalry were checked. Colonel Alderson worked partially around the flank of Leeuw Kop, but he was not supported. The move checked the enemy but the fear of nightfall precluded the possibility of catching the force.

BLOEMFONTEIN WATERWORKS.

BLOEMFONTEIN, April 23.—Colonel Alderson's Corps of mounted infantry, consisting of the first battalion of the first and second Canadian regiments and Strathcona's Horse was engaged in the operations of General Pole-Carew and General French.

Colonel Alderson had undertaken to drive the Boers from their line of defences out of the waterworks. The Canadians sustained heavy fire.

The Boers shelled Colonel Alderson's force which made a marching movement around Leeuw Kop on the extreme left of the Boer position when the British battery opened fire.

The Boers removed their guns and Leeuw Kop was found evacuated this morning.

General Dickson's cavalry brigade, which made a wide detour to the left, found its further progress barred by a strong Boer position.

Provincial Prohibition Adjourned.

LONDON, April 24.—George Douglas Campbell, eighth Duke of Argyll, is dead. He was born April 30, 1823. He was Postmaster-General from 1855 to 1858, and Secretary for India from 1863 to 1874. The Duke was a writer and his chief works include: "The Reign of Law" and "Scotland as It Was and as It is." His eldest son was the Marquis of Lorne.

THE BRITISH PEOPLE

AND LORD ROBERTS.

LONDON, April 23.—It is marvelous to note the whole-heartedness of the English public trust in Lord Roberts in his censures regarding the engagement at Spion Kop. Not a paper has attached to his criticism of General Buller—his predecessor in command—one iota of unfairness or self-interest. This, perhaps, is explained by the universal recognition of the fact that the Field Marshal has little to gain by this campaign, and that he gave up all to which long and brilliant service entitled him in order to serve his country. Whatever the outcome of the Boer war, Lord Roberts' name would stand in England's military annals as one of the most successful and best loved of her commanders. This fact is ever before the public and they believe their commander-in-chief in South Africa to be miles above any jealousies and rivalries that might actuate other generals.

—The Pioneer sees a difficulty in the way of the abolition of the party system in this province. "For instance," it says, "where there are three public officials receiving salaries it is possible to divide these three between the two parties and satisfy both." People usually see things from their own point of view.

—Speaking at Cape Town a few days ago, Sir Alfred Milner said: "I can only say that it is an essential part of my political creed that South Africa shall be governed in the interest and by the agency of the people who have made it their home. He deprecated the 'intolerant spirit and the mania of suspicion now rampant.'"
