Two Vehicles In Collision

MONTAGUE — Leonard Jordan, Murray Harbor, was rushed to the Kings County Memorial Hospital on Sunday afternoon following a two-car collision about 4 p.m. on the High Bank road. In collision with Mr. Jordan was John Angus Clarey of Murray River who was uninjured. Damage to the two vehicles was said to be in excess of \$1,000 dollars.

Last night it was reported that Mr. Jordan was not seriously hurt and was resting comfortably. He sustained cuts and bruises and was severely shaken up but it is thought no bones were broken.

The season of summer officially begins at 5:33 p.m. ADT today, June 21, according to Radio Range reports.


Temperatures today will range from a low of 55 to a high of 70 degrees, however clouds are expected to move into our district this afternoon and showers are forecast for tonight.





Eileen Simpson Captures Award

Eileen Simpson captured the Lloyd Cutcliffe Memorial Prize at Central Queens Regional High School closing last night. Helen Dickieson took the Governor General's medal for having attained the highest standing in Grade XII.

Miss Simpson's prize was the result of her having obtained the highest standing over the four-year high school program. Basil MacCoubrey, chairman of the board of trustees, presided at last night's exercises. The address to the graduates was delivered by Rev. Ross Howard, and the report of the year's work was outlined by the principal, Mrs. Winifred Cutcliffe.

Valedictorian was Marion MacNeill and the salutary was given by Helen Dickieson, a diploma winner in Grade XII. Miss Dickieson also placed first in English Literature, French, History, Biology and Geometry. Certificate winners in Grade XII were: Eileen Simpson, Marion MacNeill and Gary Toole. Diploma winners in Grade XI were: Patricia Proctor and Marilyn Carew.

The certificate winners in Grade XI were: Gordon Macdonald, Susie Gammeter, Ena Mae Moase, Lois Smith, Helen MacNeill, Jean MacKinnon, Barry Macinnis, Norma Ross and Julie Knox.

Dr. Jean Halliday MacKay of Charlottetown has been appointed assistant professor of Home Economics at Prince of Wales, it was announced by Dr. Frank MacKinnon following a meeting of the College's Board of Governors.

Dr. MacKay was born in Eldon and after graduating from Prince of Wales and Mount Allison University she took her M.A. and Ph.D. in Home Economics at Michigan State University. She taught school in Prince Edward Island before going to college during the war she served with the W.R.C.N.S.

She was assistant dietitian at the Provincial Sanatorium, taught high school in Sackville, spent three years in extension work with the Alberta Department of Agriculture, and from 1961-63 was assistant professor in Home Economics at the University of Manitoba. She is a member of the Canadian Home Economics Association and the American Home Economics Association. In 1964 she married Wendell MacKay of Charlottetown. For her many services in the field of Home Economics she was recipient of the American Home Economics Helen W. Atwater International fellowship.

Two Navy Ships Dock In Souris

SOURIS — Two Navy ships, the HMCS Cormorant, captained by E.J. Kelly, and the HMCS Mallard, captained by T. Guy Comeau, arrived here yesterday afternoon at the Railway wharf. The two ships, which came here from Pictou, each have their regular crew of six along with 10 midshipmen from various Canadian universities.

The vessels have been traveling to various European countries such as Norway, Sweden, Denmark, France, Belgium and Germany.

One of the midshipmen aboard the Cormorant is Paul McInnis of Souris. Mr. McInnis will reside here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd McInnis, until September when he will return to the University of New Brunswick, Fredericton, to complete his science course.

The vessels leave for Charlottetown this morning and it is probably that a number of details from here will travel to the city also. A dance was held at the Royal Canadian Legion last night in honor of the crews of the two ships.

Alan Holman Welcomes Cast Members




