

Imports for May.

The statement of goods imported during May, 1880, published by the EXAMINER a few days ago, did not include goods warehoused. The value of goods entered for consumption only, was given. By including the warehouse accounts for May in a statement of imports, a much more gratifying result is shown, as follows:

The total receipts at the Custom House, in May, 1880, was \$38,810.91, and in May, 1879, \$30,068.57, or an increase of \$8,742.34.

The value of goods duty paid ex warehouse in 1880, was \$4,884, and in 1879, \$7,021 or a decrease of \$2,137.

Taking the above in connection with Summertime returns, we have a total increase of imports to the value of \$65,656, and of Customs receipts, \$9,990.68, for the month of May, for the Island. It will be noted that our statement of the duty paid was substantially correct.

A Pan-British Trade Conference.

What may be called a Pan British Trade Conference is to be held in London next February. It is to be composed of one hundred and two delegates—40 from various British cities and trade organizations, and 54 from the Colonies—from Canada, 10; from Queensland, Newfoundland, Cape Town, Port Elizabeth, Natal, Tasmania and Singapore, 2 each; Adelaide, Victoria, New South Wales, Ceylon, Calcutta, Bombay, Madras, 3 each; New Zealand, 4; and West Indian Islands, 6. Preliminary arrangements have been made under the auspices of the British Chambers of Commerce Association. But the movement seems to have been mainly promoted by Mr. Paterson, Secretary of the Dominion Board of Trade. The chief subject for consideration at the conference will be, how best to promote the commerce of the Empire. Some good may result from the gathering.

Sad Death of Mr. Alex. McGregor.

The death of Mr. Alex. McGregor occurred at his residence, Lot 48, on Saturday evening, under very melancholy circumstances. About seven o'clock the members of his family were astonished on finding him in one of the farm houses, bleeding from the left arm and totally unconscious. Dr. Beer was sent for and, on arrival, saw that the unfortunate man was past recovery. The principal arteries were completely severed, the last drops of blood had almost flown, and life was fast ebbing. The wound in the arm was made at the elbow with a common jack-knife, whether with the intention of suicide or not, is unknown. Mr. McGregor has been for some time in a very low state of mind. A short time ago his son died of sunstroke in Boston. This greatly increased his troubles, which ended so sadly on Saturday. Mr. McGregor leaves a wife and family of twelve children. He was about 60 years of age, and highly respected by all who knew him.

The World's Regatta.

ARRIVAL OF HANLAN AND BOYD ON THE SCENE OF THE STRUGGLE.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 5, 1880.—Preparations for the world's regatta on the Seekonk are beginning to be visible hereabouts. The Farragansett, Brown University and Pawtucket boats clubs have made extensive arrangements for the reception and entertainment of visitors, and in a few days the erection of observation stands upon the river will be commenced. As the time approaches for the great contest, it enters quite largely into current conversation, and it is apparent that there is arising a deep interest in the affair. The oarsmen entered in the race are beginning to arrive, and probably they will all be here and in training by the middle or last of next week. Edward Hanlan and Robert Boyd, who arrived to-day from New York, were warmly greeted by the local oarsmen, and everything was done to make them speedily feel at home. Hanlan brought two boats, one of Toronto make, which he used at Washington, and the other a Waters paper shell. Boyd has a fine boat called the Alexandria, built by Swaddle & Winship. Both of the men lost no time in seeking out their boarding places in farm houses on the banks of the Seekonk, and trying the course on which they will soon be called upon to display their utmost skill. They will begin their training at once and keep it up until the day of the race. Hanlan said, after taking a good spin on the river, that the course was much better than he had been led to expect, and he was well satisfied with it; in fact, he liked it very much indeed. He proclaimed that he never was in better condition for a race, and, with a pleasant smile, said that the man who expected to beat him would have to make a faster record than has ever been done yet. Boyd also expressed himself pleased with the course, and stated that he was going to work without delay to reduce his weight, which is somewhat above the mark, and to get himself in good form. He should do his best to win, and meant, if possible, to carry "that little pile of money" back to England. Ross is also here, and was on the river to-day taking a little exercise. G. W. Weisgerber has been at his quarters nearly a week, and daily engages practice. To-day he published a challenge for John A. Kennedy to row a single-scul three mile race at Silver lake on the 26th for \$500 a side.

Science of Education—Definitions and General Principles.

- 1. Education is that perfecting of the individual which prepares him for practical usefulness. 2. That system of education is best which prepares the individual for the highest and the greatest usefulness. 3. Teaching is developing, instructing, and training mind. 4. Teaching is essential to education. 5. That method of teaching is best which best secures the chief object of education. 6. The mind can only be properly developed, instructed, and trained by the proper exercise of its powers and faculties. 7. In order to the proper exercise of the mental powers and faculties, suitable material must be furnished as subject matter for the exercise, and the mind must be properly directed in such exercise. 8. Since the pupil can only furnish a portion of the subject matter suitable for mental exercise, it is a part of the teacher's work to provide such material. 9. Since the pupil, comparatively undeveloped, uninstructed and untrained, cannot, unaided, so direct the exercise of his mind in using suitable material as to secure the most beneficial results, it is also a part of the teacher's duty to aid the pupil in securing such results. 10. The proper exercise of the mental powers and faculties upon suitable material will result in useful knowledge, development, and training. 11. That knowledge, development and training alone, is useful, which contributes to the perfection of universal being. 12. That culture, knowledge and training is most useful, which secures this object to the greatest extent. 13. The most useful culture, instruction and training, contribute most largely to the perfection of universal being by securing the highest individual perfection. 14. Hence it is the teacher's imperative duty to secure such culture, and training to his pupils. —R. A. Waterbury in the Canada School Journal.
