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LET'S EAT Dinner Cooks Itself In New Electric Oven

Every day our kitchen is busy testing new products and often new utensils. The latest utensil is a modern version of the old iron quoise procelain electric Dutch oven cooker.

"As this is made of cast aluminum, it will last a lifetime," observed the Chef "The thermostat control is built into the detachable plug. Remove it and wash all over like a dish. This cooker is really beautiful!"

Chicken Stew Cooked Electrically Clean a 4 to 5 lb. stewing chicken as necessary. Cut into serving pieces. Place in an electric Dutch oven with 1 lb. stewing beef to enrich flavor.

Set the dial at 250 degrees F. Cover and simmer 1 1/2 to 2 hrs. or until fork-tender. (Time depends on tenderness of chicken.) Remove the chicken and beef and keep warm. Strain the broth. Set the dial at 300 degrees F.

Beat 1 c. light cream or undiluted evaporated milk and 2 egg yolks and stir into the sauce. Stir in 2 tsp. lemon juice, 2 tsp. chopped parsley and 1/4 tsp. pepper. Add the chicken and 3 c. cooked peas and carrots. Serve at table from the cooker. Served 4 to 6.

Note: Use the cooked beef for hash or sandwiches. Sunday Dinner: Kidney bean saladettes; chicken stew on the terrace; crusty French bread; pickles; radishes; fresh fruits—apple cake; hot or iced coffee or tea or milk.

Home-Made Sherbet: Milk sherbets are refreshing and easy enough even for a teen-ager to make. Start off with orange sherbet, then try lemon, raspberry, or strawberry for variety.

Tomorrow's Dinner: Cole slaw saladettes; broiled swordfish steaks; flaky potatoes; carrots with young onions; orange milk sherbet; hot or iced coffee or tea or milk.

Orange Milk Sherbet: Combine 2 (14 1/2 oz.) cans undiluted evaporated milk, 2 c. sugar and 1/4 tsp. salt. Gradually stir in 1 (6 oz.) can thawed frozen orange juice and 1 tsp. lemon juice.

Trick of the Chef: Before broiling swordfish steaks brush with not-sweet French dressing and dust with minced dill.

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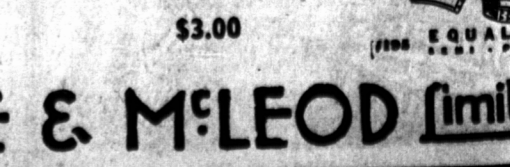
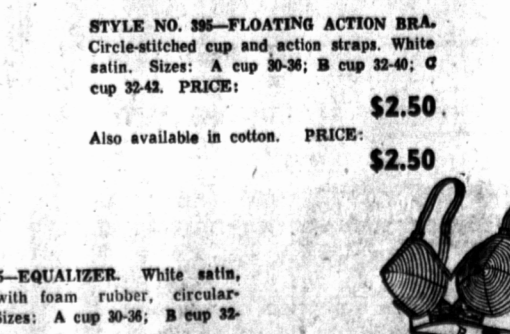
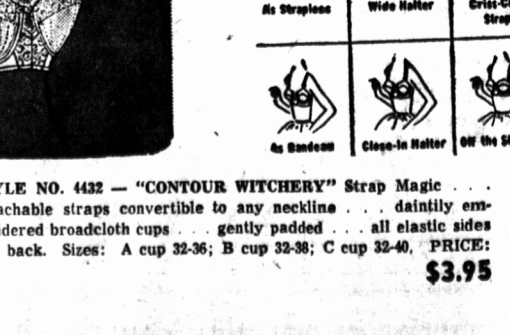
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
