Gov't Faces Problem Over Uranium Sales

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government is facing a tough decision in the next month or two over sales of uranium.

Informants say negotiations are nearing a conclusion after many months on a bid by France to buy a huge quantity of uranium on a long-term contract.

The problem involves the government's policy of refusing to sell uranium, the raw material of nuclear weapons as well as the essential ingredient of nuclear power plants, without a guarantee that the purchaser will use it solely for peaceful purposes.

With Canadian uranium producers suffering from a low world demand for their product, the French bid is particularly attractive.

And one of the talking points in the negotiations appears to be the fact that Canada has never asked assurances from Britain or the United States, this country's biggest uranium customers in the past, that the uranium sold them is not going into nuclear weapons programs.

But purchases by Britain and the U.S. have been steadily sagging. At present, Canada sells none to the U.S. and the contract to sell to Britain, already stretched out beyond its original termination date, ends next year.

The French offer is said to involve buying 25 per cent of this country's present known uranium reserves over a 25-year period.

Braves Nip Cincinnati To End Reds Streak

Milwaukee Braves, aided by four errors and two balks, snapped Cincinnati Reds' winning streak at five with a 6-5 victory in a four-inning game.

The Braves scored two of their runs on balks by Sammy Ellis, who also gave up nine of Milwaukee's 10 hits. Cincinnati home runs by Vada Pinson and Don Pavletich couldn't overcome the Braves' lead.

An infield out drove in the deciding run in the seventh inning after Mike de la Hoz singled and went to third on a double by Lee Maye.

Chicago White Sox defeated New York Yankees 12-0 to give the Yankees their ninth defeat in 11 games.

The combined sixth pitching of John Buzhardt and Bob Locker gave the Sox their victory. Floyd Robinson and Ron Hansen singled across the White Sox' runs in the first inning against Bill Stafford.

SCORE SHOOTOUTS

Three other shutouts were posted around the citrus circuit. Houston defeated Philadelphia Phillies 2-0 with the Astros' Claude Raymond pitching out of a bases-loaded jam in the ninth inning.

Jim Kaat, Dave Boswell and Jerry Fosnow allowed a total of four hits in Minnesota Twins' 3-0 triumph over Kansas City Athletics while Ron Fieche and Marcelino Lopez scattered eight hits in a 4-0 decision for Los Angeles Angels over Cleveland Indians.

Detroit Tigers nipped St. Louis Cardinals 3-2 on Willie Horton's run-scoring single in the eighth inning, and Los Angeles Dodgers erupted in the seventh inning for five runs and an 11-8 victory over New York Mets. The first seven Dodgers reached base in the uprising.

Chicago Cubs battered Juan Marichal for three home runs, whipping San Francisco Giants 7-3. Ernie Banks, Glenn Beckert and Billy Williams each hit four-baggers.

Dalton Jones' two-run single in the 10th inning boosted Boston Red Sox to an 11-9 victory over another Cleveland squad. And Pittsburgh Pirates edged the Dodgers' B team 3-2 while Baltimore's B squad stopped
