Burned Worker Remains Critical

SUMMERSIDE — The condition of Beverly MacAllister, 30, of New London, who was seriously burned in a fire at the J. Leroy Holman house here yesterday, was reported by Dr. J. K. Beer to be still critical yesterday.

The fire started about 10 a.m. Thursday when a can of arborite cement, being used by one of the men, suddenly caught fire. It is believed that the cement, highly inflammable, burst into flames when the user struck a match to light a cigarette.

MacAllister suffered serious burns when he grabbed the burning can and made a dash for outside. A fellow employee said it appeared as if MacAllister tripped on the wet out and the flaming liquid spilled over him.

Grandview Tobacco Farm Expects \$32,000 Yield

A Grandview tobacco farm will return an estimated \$32,000 from 40 acres this year, and \$30,000 of that will be profit, Leonard Vaerewyck said yesterday afternoon as he looked over a crop that will average an estimated 1,500 pounds per acre for the best production in this province since tobacco was introduced here some five years ago. Mr. Vaerewyck is producing the crop in partnership with his son-in-law, Mark Vanneste.

Mr. Vaerewyck came from Belgium with his father when he was 12 years old, and has been in tobacco ever since. He was with the government's experimental farm in Delhi, Ont. for 12 years.

Mr. Vanneste grew tobacco with his dad in Ontario before he came to the Island.

The top field will produce 1,700 to 1,800 pounds to the acre, Mr. Vaerewyck told The Guardian.

Mr. Vaerewyck and Vanneste combination planted the first tobacco plants on May 22 and completed the job on June 13. The first leaves were harvested yesterday, August 13, and the harvesting will be completed about September 20, it is estimated.

It costs about \$300 an acre to produce an acre of tobacco in Prince Edward Island, Mr. Vaerewyck states. This year's crop should average a gross return of \$800.

"It would cost perhaps \$600 per acre to grow the same crop in Ontario. Hall insurance alone would cost \$1,000 for a crop of my size, and irrigation adds greatly to the expense. Wages are also higher," he said.

The leaf is thicker this year, the Grandview man said. That makes it weigh heavier, and it is also better quality. The leaves are a bit sticky, almost like the feel of gum, and he likes to see them that way, for it adds up to a quality crop.

NEW EQUIPMENT

There were 16 people working on harvesting the crop yesterday, including Mr. Vaerewyck and Mr. Vanneste. That number will be employed through the season.

They were using a new tobacco elevator yesterday — it arrived in mid-week from Ontario and will probably cost \$300, or maybe more. But it'll pay for itself. It cuts down on the labor and it carries the tied "sticks" of tobacco to the kilns without any damage to the leaves. And they are highly susceptible to damage, it was explained.

There is a mechanical tying machine on the market now, and they are experimenting in Ontario with a tobacco harvester, that will pick the lower leaves and ignore the others, for example, as has to be done when "priming" or harvesting starts.

They've been most fortunate in their rainfall in Grandview, the Vanneste-Vaerewyck combination believe. They had rain mostly every two weeks, and it was just enough for a fine crop, the joint-owners suggest.

Lack of heavy rains is good for tobacco. One of the problems with irrigation in Ontario, it was suggested, is the danger over irrigating and spoiling the crop.

The Grandview operators are sold on the possibility of the Island as a tobacco producing area. You need a little luck in anything you do, but you can make good money on tobacco if you know what you are doing and pay strict attention to the job, they emphasize.

But you could lose \$5,000 to \$6,000 easily, if you lost five or six kilns of tobacco in the fall," he contrasted.

Incidentally there was one heavy frost last spring after the early plants were put in the ground at Grandview. But it didn't have any bad effects. Delcrest is the variety grown in the province, but the Delcrest gives a better weight, Mr. Vaerewyck stated.

They use a No. 2 grade of oil for heating in the kilns at Grandview. It costs 18.7 cents per gallon, and is considered cheaper than propane. It costs about \$40 to cure a kiln that way.

A kiln of tobacco normally averages about 2,000 pounds, and sometimes it is much heavier. One contained slightly more than 2,900 pounds last year. There'll be 28 kilns this year, and may be as high as 30 kilns of tobacco Mr. Vaerewyck suggested.

They are strong believers in early planting, it was emphasized. Even if frost does strike the new plants at times, the risk is not great enough to forego the advantages of early planting.

"What if you should lose some plants one year in five, for example? The damage is negligible. You have the plants yourself and you only lose the labor."
